MONOXIDE GAS CAUSE OF
DEATHS AT NEW GLASGOW

That carbon monoxide gas caused
the deaths of Margaret MacDonald
and Chipman Reid in the former's
room in New Glasgow during the
night of Jan. 15th, and caused the
dangerous illness of Dr. A. G. Nicholls,
provincial bacteriologist who concluded
at noon on Saturday an exhaustive
series of tests with the blood of the
living victim and organs of the dead
girl.

SAILS

Ships Leave After a Long Wait on
Coast.

New York.—A saturated market in
the bootlegging trade and a cut rate
war were named at prohibition head-
quarters as the principal causes for
the withdrawal of the rum running
fleet operating outside the harbor of
New York.

Information indicating that the rum
fleet had dwindled within the last ten
days and that the liquor laden ships
had proceeded to the Massachusetts
and Rhode Island coast, was received
here at the same time that reports
came from Atlantic City telling of a
glut in the rum market of the Jersey
coast resort and of preparations of
federal prohibition agents to go be-
fore grand juries.

"Word was received here Tuesday,"
said an official at prohibition head-
quarters, "to the effect that the
greater part of the rum fleet has
moved off the New England coast in
the vicinity of Boston, Newport, Nan-
tucket and Narragansett Pier."

"The customs officials and the pro-
hibition forces have been more alert
in the last few days. The rum run-
ners can get better prices off the
New England coast and will not go
so closely watched."

"There is one steamship off the
Jersey coast we are watching closely,
however."

"I have been told she has 33,000
cases of liquor on board. The ar-
rival of this steamship induced the
smaller vessels to seek new locations
as competition has been quite keen."

Plan to libel ships in the rum fleet
as fast as their identities are estab-
lished are being laid by federal pro-
hibition agents, who have discovered
in Atlantic City evidence of the land-
ing of vast quantities of Scotch and
rye of pre-prohibition quality, accord-
ing to an Associated Press despatch
from the Jersey resort.

"The liquor is alleged to have been
brought ashore by rum boats which
have eluded the dry navy coastguard
blockade which has been maintained
since a big rum fleet appeared off
the coast," says the despatch.

"Evidence gathered by the federal
agents," it was stated, "will go direct-
ly before federal grand juries and in-
dictments will be sought. Persons
involved will first hear they are under
investigation when they are arrested."

"It is also planned to libel the rum
running craft as fast as their identi-
ties can be discovered."

Scotch at \$65 and \$75 a case, and
rye at from \$60 to \$70 was reported
to be found in abundance at Atlantic
City as the result of the presence of
the Jersey coast of a craft laden with
liquor from the Bahamas.

In order to encourage Canadian
literature the Imperial Order Daugh-
ters of the Empire is offering two
prizes: the first of the value of \$200
for the best short story, the second
of the value of \$100 for the best one-
act play. These prizes will be offered
annually for ten years. The condi-
tions under which they will be award-
ed this year are as follows:—

The Short Story

1. It must not have been published
before being submitted in this
competition.
2. It must not contain less than
two thousand words nor more than
six thousand.
3. It must be typewritten on paper
of letter size (8 1/2 x 11 inches) and
written on one side of the paper only.
4. It must be sent flat, not folded
or rolled, have the author's "nom de
plume", but not his or her real name,
on the title page, be registered and
mailed to the National Educational
Secretary, I.O.D.E., 238 Bloor Street
East, Toronto.
5. A sealed envelope with the
"nom de plume" printed or written
clearly upon it, and the author's name
within it, must accompany the manu-
script.
6. The manuscript must be sub-
mitted on or before April 1st, 1923.
7. The writer must be a British
subject.
8. The copyright of the story ad-
judged the best is to be vested in
the Imperial Order Daughters of the
Empire with power to arrange for
its publication in magazine or in book
form or in both.

The Play

1. It must be a one-act play.
2. Its presentation on the stage
should occupy not less than twenty
minutes nor more than thirty minutes.
3. It must not have been published
before being submitted in this
competition.

Conditions 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 for the
Short Story apply also for The Play.

Names of the judges selected by
the members of the Canadian Author's
Association will be announced at a
later date.

LARGE FLEET FOR CATTLE SHIPMENTS

Indications Point to a Heavy Move-
ment of Cattle the Coming
St. Lawrence Season.

Montreal.—Five or six vessels will
be placed by the White Star Line on
the St. Lawrence route this year in
the cattle-carrying trade, according to
Major P. A. Curry, Montreal man-
ager of the company. There were
indications, said Major Curry, that
the movement of cattle from Canada
this year would be heavy. He placed
the stock to be moved at roughly one
hundred thousand head. The ship-
ment of cattle for fattening in Great
Britain this season, he said, would be
limited only by the tonnage available.

DEATH PENALTY FOR ALL GERMANS

Caught in The Act of Tampering
With Railroad Equipment.

Duesseldorf.—The death penalty
will be inflicted on Germans caught
in the act of tampering with railroad
equipment or signal boxes or for
other acts of sabotage endangering
the lives of travellers, the French
authorities announced. This is the
first time that threats of capital pun-
ishment have been made by the oc-
cupying authorities.
