He was graduated from Acadia college, and later pursued his studies in Harvard University, from which institution he graduated in medicine in the year 1903.

In the year 1909 Dr. Morse married Miss Mable M. Elliott of Clarence, N. S., a daughter of the late Deacon Edwin J. and Mrs. Elliott of that place.

Miss Elliott, a talented musician, pursued instrumental and violin courses at Acadia Seminary and was graduated in piano in the year 1903.

After their marriage Dr. and Mrs. Morse resided in Cambridge, Mass., where Dr. had an extensive practice.

After some years came the failure in health of his mother, Mrs. Joseph C. Morse of Paradise, and in order that she might have his personal supervision, Dr. Morse, his wife and two little daughters returned to the home land.
