The week has been a favorable one, and the trade in all departments is exhibiting unmistakes able signs of improvement. FLORA.—There has been a brisk speculative demand for Flour since our last review, at prices satisfactory 'o holdera. The news by the two Bleamers of last week had the effect of advancing prices to the views of holders, and transactions to a considerable extent were consummated. This week the unfavorable advices have had but little week the unfavorable advices have had but little effect on the market, owing to the fact that the stock both present and prospective is very small. For Superfine, the enquiry is pretty active, and rates are firm, but other grades are comparatively dull. We quote Superfine \$5 15 to \$5 25; Fancy \$5 40 to \$5 60; Extra \$6 00 to \$6 12; Double Extra \$6 50 to \$7 00. "Lambton, (double extra) is held at \$7 00 per harret. The quantity offering is small, and no pressure is felt in the market.

OATHER Is not scarce,—we note some sales of round lots at \$4.00 to \$4.10 per harrel.

When has been pretty freely bought in for this season of the year, and has found ready sale at full rates. There has been only slight fluctuation on the market, which closes pretty firm, at about last week's rates. The quality of the white wheat continues to the end to be excellent, although now and again a day a deligners are not though new and again, a day a deliveries are not up to the average. On Tuesday, which was per-haps the last day of the week, over 2000 bushels laps the last day of the week, over 3000 bushels were bought from buyers at an average of \$1 35 per bushel, the range of prices extending from \$1 25 to \$1 80 for inferior, \$1 80 to \$1 38 for ordinary to good, and from that to \$1 42 for the primest lots. Dealers in the country who buy for this market, should bear in mind that outside figures paid here are on criterion by which to repetition between a large number of buyers, who seldom pay these high figures except for a prime lead, the quality of which he knows to be unformly good, because he knows it to be grown on one farm, which is not the case with a car load, or larger quantity from a number of farms.
