" llow much improved steam navigation las done for tho Indian trade may be estimated by the following facts, which I take from some memorandum of mine:-The declared vale of Mritish and Irish manufactures exported to India in 1848 scarcely exceered $£ 5,000,000$; in 1868 it reached £21,201,773. In 1872 the exports were nearly doubled, owing to the canal steamers. These figures do not include the transit trade 10 India through Egypt, nor do they include tressure, the trade io precions genus or the large exports of apecie, or of any mercantile transactions. Judging from the Board of Trade annual statements, wo find that no countro in the world in 1868 took 60 large an amount of our merchandisa except the United States. But the United States on! apparently stood first on the list, as only a portion of the trade returas for India were shown. The imports into the United Kingdom from British India were $£ 18,000$,000 in 1853 ; in 1868 they were of the ralue of $530,071,872$; in 1872 thes were about a third higher. In 1864 the inports rose to £52, 295,599, oring to special flactuations in trade. These figures areagaln irrespectiva of the great bulk of merchandise which passes through our well known establishod P. and O.line through Egypt.
"If, then, these figures represent the merchardiso round the Cape, it can easily be imagined that the exports and imports rill be more than quadrapled if a throagh line of land communicstion were to be csia. blished between the Exst and tho West.' Broad Arron, 23 rd August.
