UNITED STATES.

Enquires have been made by the American Lumberman to ascertain the prospective input of logs this winter. The replies received seem to indicate that. in comparison with last winter, there will be a decrease of from 10 to 15 per cent. in the production of pine logs, and an increase of about 10 per cent. in the cut of hardwoods. If this estimate should prove nearly correct, it is not probable that the season of 1900 will witness any material deprecation in lumber prices. Sales The market is now very strong. are reported at Wisconsin mills of mill culls at \$12, No. 3 boards at \$13, No. 2 at \$15 and No. 1 at \$17, and it is predicted that mill culls will reach \$13 before many weeks. It is stated that the cut of mill culls in some districts for the first half of the season has already been sold. At Bay City and Sagmaw some changes in prices of pine have been made within the past fortnight. One to two inch uppers and selects have been advanced by about \$2 per thousand. No. 1 and No. 2 barn boards are about \$1 higher, as is also shipping culls of narrow widths. Shaky clear stock has advanced \$2, selling from \$28 to \$30. Shingles are unchanged, but No. 1 white pine lath is slightly easier, selling in the Pay City market at \$3.50, against \$3.75 a few weeks ago. Attention is also directed to the changes in the Buffalo and Tona wanda price list of white pine stock.

Firmness still characterizes the haidwood market. Basswood has been sold at \$22.50 for firsts and seconds delivered in Chicago. Brown ash is held at high figures, Wisconsin manufacturers asking \$21 for log run at the mills.

Shingle prices remain stationary. Dealers in the Eastern States are holding stock firmly, believing that the production this season will not be large.

FOREIGN.

Stock in the hands of brokers in Great Britaln is gradually becoming diminished. Buyers now seem to realize that the high prices asked for spot goods are warranted by the enhanced values at which contracts for new stock are being placed. At London, Liverpool and Glasgow the volume of trade is considerable, spruce and pine selling freely. Prices realized at recent public sales have been exceptionally good. Second quality spruce sold in London at Lio, third quality 3 x 9 at L9 15s, and 3 x 7 and 3 x 8 at L9 5s. In that market there is a great scarcity of fourth quality spruce. Several sales of pine are reported, and considering the quality of the stock, the prices must be regarded as satisfactory.

THE BOSTON MARKET.

(Correspondence of the CANADA LUMBERMAN.)

The tone of the spruce lumber market is m. There are indications that at the meeting of the agreement association on the 14th prices will be advanced. This will be done on the general firmness of the situation. There is a certainty that the volume of logs that will be got out will be very much reduced by the terribly deep snow that has prevailed for some time. The season for hauling is rapidly drawing to a close. The last of March brings the last of the teams out of the woods.

It is estimated that the cut of spruce must fall a good deal short of that of a year ago, which was not a large one. At the same time, it is mentioned in the trade that to again put up prices will work harm to the building trade; for already that trade is a good deal hampered by the increased cost of all classes of building materials. It is believed that another increase in the cost of spruce will still further help to check building operations this year. Spruce boards have already been further advanced and are at least \$1.50 higher. Present agreement prices are:

THE LIVERPOOL MARKET.

Farnworth & Jardine's wood circular of 1st March reviews the Liverpool market as fol-

The arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 2,048 tons register, against 2,599 tons register during the corresponding month last year, and the aggregate tonnage to this date from all places during the years 1898, 1899, and 1900 has been 33,704. 26,448, and 28,605 tons respectively. The business of the past month has been on the whole fairly satisfactory. The arrivals generally have been moderate, the deliveries have more than kept more and stocks with have more than kept pace, and stocks, with few exceptions, are light. There is little change in values to report, and the advanced prices are being fairly maintained.

CANADIAN WOODS.—Pine Timber

Waney the deliveries have been small, but the stock has been reduced to a very moderate compass, and prices are firm; strong advance in prices is being quoted for next season's ship-ment. Square. There is only a limited enquiry, and the stock is sufficient. Red Pine. There has been rather more enquiry for large wood for future requirements: the stock is almost exhausted. Oak shows some improvement in value, and the deliveries have been fair, but the stock, although not heavy, appears to be sufficient for the present. Elm continues in good request at full prices, and the stock is very light. Ash: There is a moderate demand for large wood, values are There has been more enquiry and the deliveries have again been fairly satisfactory; values have improved. The stock is being reduced, but it is still heavy, however, largely composed of oddments. Red Pine Deals are in good demand at firm prices.

NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA SPRUCE AND PINE DEALS.—The arrivals show a decline on the same month last year, viz. .— 1,070 standards, against 2,060 standards; the deliveries have been fair and the stocks are not too large. Prices continue steady, and more

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
