But no—there it stood for a while, looking round as though 'hinking what had better be done. Then it commenced travelling up and down examining each thread, until at last it reached a broken one. No sooner did it discern the break, than it set to work splicing and mending it. Then it went to the others in turn, and when they were all repaired, it returned to the centre, and resumed the work of weaving. The little thing

seemed to realize that until those broken parts were repaired there was no use in proceeding with the work. Its web would always be weak and insecure.

Dear fellow worker how are you working? Is there a feeling of insecurity? If so, why is it? Examine yourself. Go back over your past history since you first entered the service. Do you discover a point where communion with the Master has been broken? Is not this the secret of your weakness? I beseech you, learn a lesson from the little spider. Do not proceed further until all has been made right. Remember your work will ever be unsatisfactory, and unstable if the mainstays of the web of your life's work are not properly connected.
