It is not expensive to have a neat flower garden, and such trees and shrubs as delight the eye and make home attractive far more than costly objects .-Nor is it prodigality, but rather economy, to have neat and durable outbuildings, fences, gates, and other farm appurtenances and conveniences, including the best labor-saving implements and tools to facilitate and lessen both farm and domestic operations. And, by the way, it is never wise to give the boys the poorest rakes, hoes, etc., and then complain because they do not accomplish as much as full-grown, ablebodied men. It is only just that they, being weaker, should be accorded the best tools and be favoured and encouraged in other respects.

Some farmers-we trust their number is increasing—wisely encourage their sons by giving them plots of ground to cultivate for their own benefit; or animals, the increase or product of which is to be their own. In this. and the like manner, many a young boy has been encouraged, given lessens in management, and acquired means which not only produced contentment, but led prove suggestive to those parsimonious farmers who force their sons to remain at home, laboring almost unceasingly, with rare holidays or opportunities for amusement or improvement.
