

Inquiries of the Ministry

Hon. Walter L. Gordon (Minister of Finance): I am not clear as to the question. Would my hon. friend be kind enough to repeat it a little more specifically?

Mr. Pugh: Does the minister's department keep a breakdown of the revenue to the government as a result of the 11 per cent sales tax?

Mr. Gordon: Mr. Speaker, there seems to be quite a lot of misunderstanding about this tax. I should like to point out, if I may, that it is a general tax which applies to a wide variety of products. The Leader of the Opposition asked me a question the other day. He seemed to think it was a tax that had been placed on drugs by the government.

Mr. Diefenbaker: What has that got to do with building materials?

Mr. Gordon: The tax has applied to drugs for a long time, and I would remind my hon. friend that it was his government that increased it to 11 per cent.

Right Hon. J. G. Diefenbaker (Leader of the Opposition): Mr. Speaker, that kind of evasive action is the reason the Canadian economy is slipping in so far as our balance of payments is concerned. Can the minister give the intelligent answer we would like to have as to how much is realized month by month from the imposition of the 11 per cent sales tax on building materials? I understood that to be the question. Does the minister's evasion indicate that they have no such records?

Mr. Gordon: I do not know whether my so-called evasive answers are responsible for the improvement in the economy, but if so perhaps it is worth while. As far as this specific question is concerned, I would be glad to get the information and supply it to the Leader of the Opposition.

Mr. Diefenbaker: If you had said that in the first place you would not have had any difficulty.

Mr. Speaker: Order. It seems to me that this particular matter has been well gone into.
