BANKRUPTCY

STOA GALLERY, LTD.-ALLEGED FRAUD AND FALSIFICATION

Mr. R. Gordon L. Fairweather (Fundy-Royal): Mr. Speaker, this is a follow-up to my question of yesterday to the Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs. Did a trustee in bankruptcy recommend in 1967 that the President of Stoa Gallery Ltd. of Montreal be "brought before the courts to stand trial for fraud and falsification," and what action is the government taking?

Hon. Ron Basford (Minister of Consumer and Corporate Affairs): Yes, Mr. Speaker. The facts in the hon. member's question are correct. At the time the report was made by Mr. Margiese, the trustee, the subject of bankruptcy was and had been for some time under intensive investigation by the R.C.M.P., at the request of the Superintendent of Bankruptcy. Whatever evidence was discovered as a result of that investigation was, as is the usual practice in these matters, submitted to the Department of Justice.

Mr. Fairweather: As a supplementary question to the Minister of Justice may I ask whether charges have been preferred against the person involved as yet?

Hon. John N. Turner (Minister of Justice): No. sir.
