Weeks Should Also Be Set ELECTRIC RAKE **GATHERS NAILS**

Invention Will Clean the Road Cinders From All Foreign Matter.

iron objects, has been found to be provide in freeing road cinders from foreign matter. In the teaming tunnel beneath the federal building at Chicago it was necessary to spread cinders on the inclines in order to prevent the horses from slipping. The cinders used were found to contain a large number of nails and other objects. So many of the horses were injured by running nails into their hoofs that every effort, including sifting, was employed to safeguard against the danger. This falled, however, and the trouble containued until one of the electricians constructed a heavy rake, the staggered-set prongs of which were horseshoe-shaped magnets. The colls were joined in series, while connecting wires extended along the handle and then thru a heavy insulation to light sockets in the side walls. Approximately five pounds of nails and short wire was collected in a few minutes from a small portion of the underground driveway.
