

GERMAN MASSES EAGER FOR PEACE

Leibknecht So Declared Boldly in Speech in Reichstag.

CO-OPERATION URGED

Herr Wiener Contends Germany Was Subjected to "Dastardly Attack."

BERLIN (via London), June 25.—The debate in the Prussian Chamber of Deputies yesterday, in which the attitude of the German people toward peace was discussed by Progressive and Socialist members, who were in turn answered by a government official, the minister of the interior, is attracting considerable attention this morning.

Herr Braun, Herr Wiener and Dr. Karl Liebknecht took part in the exchange. The morning newspapers say in reporting the proceedings:

Herr Wiener (Progressive) cited with signs of approval, from the members an article by Hugo Heinemann, Socialist, to the effect that no German wants peace until Germany's enemies are willing to concede her the right to develop her economic and cultural powers.

To this statement Dr. Karl Liebknecht, one of the Socialist leaders, interjected: "We have the masses with us, and the masses want peace."

After this interruption Herr Wiener continued: "We are convinced that the co-operation of all parties and classes is essential, and that it means German victory. In this co-operation we found the guarantee that we will hold out, and that we will be spared from such dastardly attacks in the future."

FRENCH FOODSTUFFS GIVEN LUXEMBURG

Germany Refused to Feed Starving Population of Grand Duchy.

SITUATION DESPERATE

Supplies Were Transported to Luxembourg by Way of Switzerland.

PARIS, June 25, 5.35 p.m.—The arrival of the first consignment from Switzerland of foodstuffs to be supplied to Luxembourg until the harvest is reaped caused the greatest rejoicing today in the Grand Duchy.

The situation in the grand duchy has been desperate for some time. At the end of March the population already had been given bread cards limiting the consumption of bread to seven ounces daily, and later this amount was reduced to four ounces. In the middle of April the Mayor of Luxembourg announced that that city alone required 6000 barrels of flour and 1000 barrels each of barley, beans and rice to stave off starvation until the crops were available. The country districts of the industrial town of Echternach are even in a worse plight.

Germany's Refusal.

The Luxembourg Government sought relief thru the American Commission for relief in Belgium, which, however, was powerless to act as it lacked the co-operation of Great Britain and Germany. The British Government claimed that as Germany had forcibly occupied the grand duchy she must feed the population. This Germany formally refused to do, whereupon Great Britain declined to permit the passage by way of Holland of foodstuffs destined for the grand duchy.
