In this co-operation is found the guarantee that we will held out, and that we will be spared from such dastardly attacks in the future."

At the end of March the population already had been given bread cards limiting the consumption of bread to seven ounces daily, and later this amount was reduced to four ounces In the middle of April the Mayor of Luxemburg announced that that city alone required 6000 barrels of flour and 1000 barrels each of barley, beans and rice to stave off starvation until the crops were available. The country districts of the industrial Town of Echternach are even in a worse plight.

Germany's Refusal. The Luxemburg Government sought relief thru the American Commission for relief in Belgium, which however, was powerless to act as it lacked the co-operation of Great Britain and Germany. The British Government claim ed that as Germany had forcibly oc cupied the grand duchy she must feed the population. This Germany formally refused to do, whereupon Great Britain declined to permit the passage by way of Holland of foodstuffs desined for the grand duchy.


