FINE PATRIOTIC RALLY HELD AT ORANGEVILLE

Toronto Officers Present on Recruiting Campaign—Large Sum Raised.

ORANGEVILLE, July 16.—Local patriotic enthusiasm was greatly stimulated last night by a demonstration at Alexander Park. Major Heron, Capt. Eric Armour and Lieut. F. Aylesworth of the 38th Regiment arrived on the evening train.

Our village council is doing all it can to aid, but even with official duties being so heavy, it is not adequate. The burden falls upon us. So many families are afflicted, so many have lost their homes, so many are in this war is so long, that we are in need of your help.
