What then is the remedy for this impending evil ? It is, to reduce the army to the number of regiments kept up before the war ; the addition of the militia, is more than sufficient to answer any argument that may be pretended to be drawn from the increase of territory ;——to enquire strictly into the additional number of offices in the household and elsewhere ;——to enforce the execution of that law, that excludes such pensioners from the House of Commons, and to propose a new one, that may tie up the hands of the m——, more strictly, in this particular.

These propositions will be a civil test of revolution principles : I am sure his present M—— will wish so glorious an example to be set in his reign ; and I think a m——, who pretends to stand only upon the rectitude of his measures, cannot decently, and consistently oppose them ; if he does not, but on the other hand,
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
