Receipts Were More Than Two Million Less Than Expenditures.

Victoria, B.C., Feb. 8.-The public accounts of British Columbia for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1917, were brought down in the legislature vesterday, showing a revenue of \$5,-906,783 with an expenditure of \$9,-079,317, a deficit of \$2,172,534. This compares favorably with the previous year's deficit of \$3,588,968. The largest item of revenue came from timber royalties and licenses, which totaled \$1,759,469. The personal property tax brought in the largest annual total in the history of the levy in the pro-vince, \$291,412.93 being received from


