SECURITY OF ALLIES IN EAST GUARANTEED

Paris, Sept. 30.—The only statement thus far officially made is that Bul-garia has accepted all the terms that the French commander presented in the name of the allied governments. An official statement says:
"No diplomatic negotiation is actu-ally in progress in Bulgaria, and con-sequently no political conditions have been laid down for her."
With respect to the conditions of the armistice, it is added: "These conditions have been submitted by the General Franco-British d'Esperey to the allied governments, who approved them. They are of purely military character; designed to guarantee in a complete manner the security and the liberty of the allied army in the orient, and to furnish every guarantee for the development of pour parlars."

BULGARIA'S COLLAPSE HEARTENS SALOON MEN

New York, Sept. 30.—Instead of more than one-third of the saloons in New York going out of business on Oct. 1, as was predicted a week ago, saloonkeepers took heart at the news of Bulgaria's surrender, which was interpreted as meaning an early end to the war, and hastened to apply for a renewal of their licenses today, the last day of grace.
As a result, tonight excise officials in Manhattan had issued 3099 licenses for saloons, and 349 for family liquor stores, as compared to the corre-sponding figures of 3733 and 483 last year.

MINERS TURN DOWN COMMISSIONER'S OFFER

Fernie, B.C., Sept. 30.—By a unani-mous vote the miners of Fernie and Michel, at a meeting here today, re-fused to return to work in the Crow's Nest Pass Company's mine at Coal Creek in accordance with the pro-posal of Fuel Commissioner Arm-strong. The proposal was that they return to work on a single shift, ex-cept in cases where development work was being carried on, in which case they were to work on double shift pending the finding of a royal com-mission as proposed by Hon. Wm. Sloan, minister of mines.

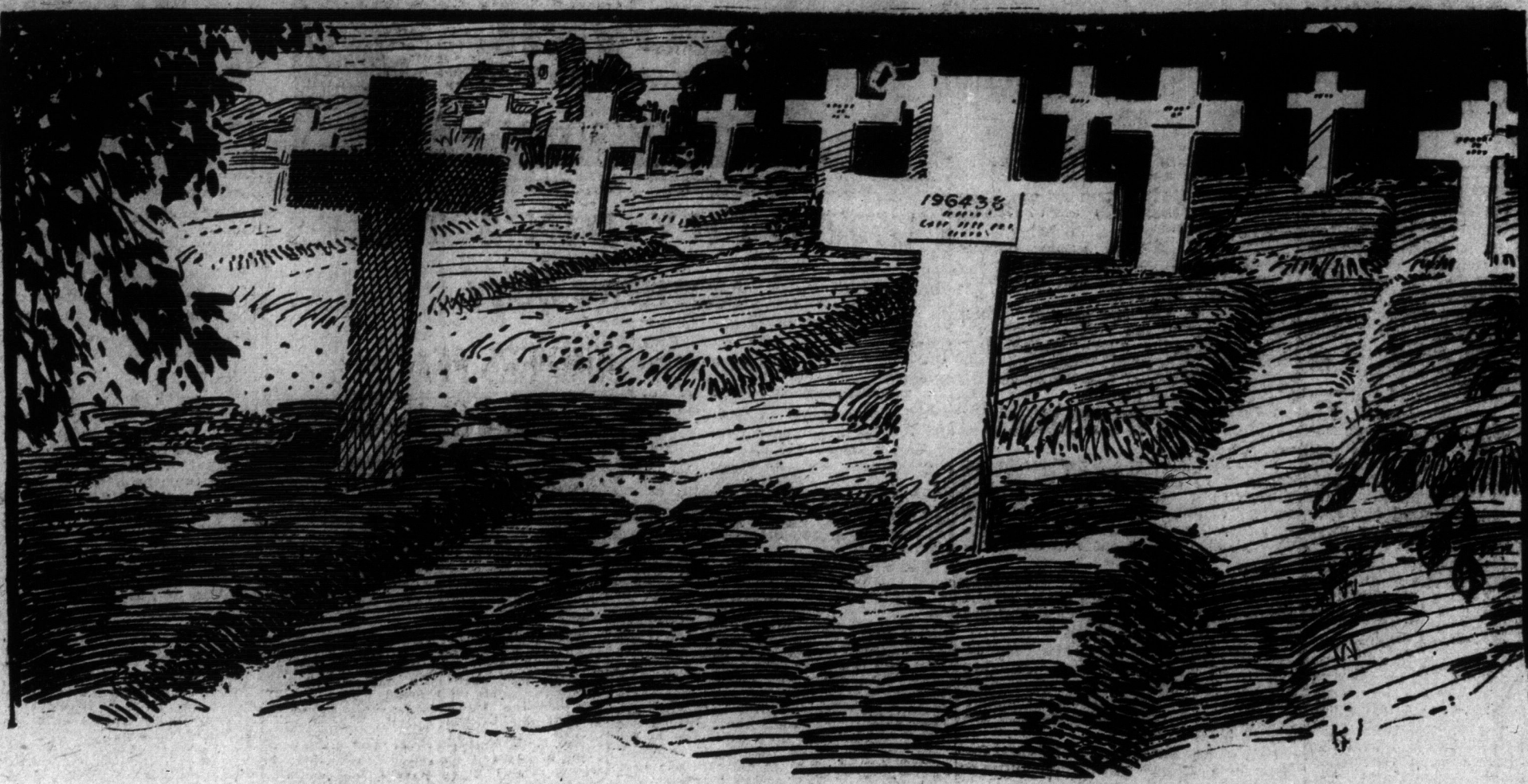

NOVA SCOTIA TO RELIEVE BOSTON'S URGENT NEED

Boston, Sept. 30.—Governor McCall tonight received from Lieut. Governor McCallum Grant of Nova Scotia, the following telegram:
"This province cannot fail to recall with gratitude the magnificent and immediate response Massachusetts made in the time of our urgent need at Halifax. Some nurses have already gone to help you and more both of doctors and nurses will follow as you may require them."
The aid extended by federal and other outside workers in Massachu-setts to the state authorities in or-ganizing the campaign against influ-enza led the state department of health tonight to express its expectation that the epidemic would be checked before gaining further headway.

KING ALFONSO ILL.

Madrid, Sept. 30.—There has been considerable spread of Spanish influ-enza through Spain within the last week or ten days. King Alfonso has been among its latest victims, but is reported as not seriously ill.

The Catholic Army Huts Association erect, equip and conduct Army Huts for Canadian soldiers, which serve the two-fold purpose of recreation huts for all soldiers, and chapels for Catholic soldiers. The work is under the direction and control of the British Imperial Military authorities.

The aim of the Association is to keep Canadian soldiers clean in soul and body. The recreation huts are for the use of any and every soldier. All are welcome. These huts provide a place where men in khaki, regardless of creed, may assemble for wholesome amuse-ment.

The chapel huts are gathering centres where Catholic soldiers may receive the fortifying influence of their own faith.

Welcome hostels are maintained in the City of London, where large numbers of Canadians are constantly on leave.

Entertainments are held for the soldiers, at which refreshments and comforts are provided. Athletic supplies, graphophones, pianos and moving picture outfits are part of the equip-ment of every hut.

There is a regular distribution of chocolates and other confections and magazines free of

charge at the sing-songs and parties held in the Canadian Camp Hospitals.

Special efforts are made to keep the boys in touch with their homes. Hot tea and coffee are distributed free to men coming from the trenches.

Letterheads and envelopes are provided free to soldiers. Good, clean literature, newspap-ers, magazines and prayer books are furnished regularly without charge.

A Central Information Bureau is maintained, and all possible statistics are there recorded, for the service of loved ones at home.
