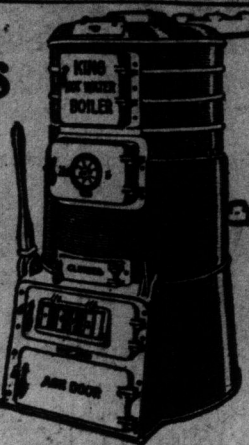

ENNISCLARE FARMS WIN AT ROCHESTER

In Hunting and Jumping, Canadian Stables in Front at Big Show.

Rochester, N.Y., Sept. 1.—With nearly 1,300 entries, the largest in its history, the Rochester horse show enjoyed a splendid opening today, the best of the American and Canadian stables being fully represented. In the hunting and jumping classes the Canadian stables were awarded the large majority of the honors, Ennisclare Farms of Oakville won 12 of a possible 16 ribbons in four classes shown.

In the novice middleweight hunters, Ennisclare Farms won all of the four ribbons, Ridgely winning first, Indian Arrow second, Ondremon third, and Rempstone fourth, and in the novice heavyweight hunters, Ennisclare took first with Newburn, second with The Strand, and third with The Whip. Bates of Ottawa taking fourth ribbon. In the novice lightweight hunters they won second with Hallow, third with Shot, and fourth with Matt H. There were 67 entries in the open jumping class, which provided a wonderful contest. The Wood Farm of Chicago won, with Jack Hamilton riding, first and third, and Ennisclare won second and fourth with Ridgely and Loughborough, ridden by Hugh Wilson, who rode all of the Ennisclare horses.

WHOLESALE ARRESTS IN WEST HUNGARY

All Persons Suspected of Sympathy With Communists Are Being Persecuted.

Vienna, Sept. 1.—The Viennese newspaper continued today its reports of wholesale arrests and persecutions in western Hungary of all persons charged with or suspected of being in sympathy with the Communists. The same conditions are said to prevail in the trans-Danubian region, where pogroms are reported to be in progress.

Many specific instances of arrests and cruelties are recited, with the names of the places where they occurred and details. It is said that the allied military mission at Budapest has been apprised of the situation. Paul Garami, former Hungarian minister of justice who has arrived in Vienna on his way to Switzerland, is reported to have confirmed these reports, particularly with respect to the pogroms.

The political situation in Hungary is unchanged. The Friedrich government has issued the election program, providing for universal suffrage, a literacy test for women, but not for men. The age limit for voters is 24 years, for both sexes. These elections are expected to be held about Sept. 20.

THREATEN TO CLOSE ALL PARIS THEATRES

Reply of Directors of Amusement Places to Demands of Actors' Union.

Paris, Sept. 1.—Directors of theatres, moving picture houses and music and concert halls have refused to deal with the Federation of Theatrical Employees' Union, the first demand of which was to forbid the engagement of a union or employe not a member of a union. A resolution was passed, however, expressing the statement of the directors to discuss matters with the unions with each class of employe, and so meet artists and employes who do not belong to any organization.

After considering the demands recently presented by employes, which were chiefly for higher wages, the directors issued a statement to the press, saying they would "stand by the threatened strike, as it is becoming impossible for us to live." The demands of the employes will be accompanied by a request that the directors send an answer by Sept. 1. The directors declared that if a strike was called at one theatre, every theatrical establishment in Paris and its suburbs would be closed.

ACTORS BECOME MANAGERS

Chicago, Sept. 1.—Striking actors became managers today when the Actors' Equity Association opened a week's engagement at the Auditorium with a vaudeville bill enlisting the services of a score or more of stars. Two hundred actors took part in the initial performance.

SOLDIERS GRANTED AMNESTY.

Rome, Sept. 1.—Forty thousand Italian soldiers, sentenced to long periods of imprisonment during the war, were granted amnesty today by King Victor Emmanuel.
