Newmarket Sensation Likely to Be Renewed - Creditors Have Not Accepted Compromise.

Newmarket, Sept. 9.-Interest in the case of T. H. Lloyd is growing again, as the case comes up on Tuesday in the criminal assizes on three charges of embezzlement

Since the revelations were first made known, T. H. Lloyd has not strengthened his position with his creditors. Meetings of his creditors have been held, a striking feature of which was the absence of the man most vitally interested. Again his failure to take his creditors into his confidence, and his oft-repeated statement that he has had no opportunity to adjust his difficulties has, it is said, prejudiced nis standing with his creditors. The offer made by his solicitor at a meeting some three weeks ago is virtually regarded as an abandonment of the plea that if given time the creditors would be paid in full. The offer in effect was the payment of \$5000, being presumably the amount over and above the mortgage on the Sovereign Bank building, the book debts, library, the houshold goods and his equity in the Foresters. This was conditional upon the withdrawal of all criminal proceedings. The Some Favored Privilege to In nocent Party Division Supported House of Bishops. Quebec, Sept. 9.-(Special.)-In the Anglican Synod this morning a committee was appointed to draft an ad-

dress to the Lord Archbishop on the occasion of his 90th birthday. A vote of thanks was passed to the presiding bishop of the American church for his service to the synod.

A message was received from the house of bishops, respecting marriage and divorce, that no clergyman within the jurisdiction of the church in Canada solemnize marriage between persons who have been previously married and divorced, and asking concurrence. Dr. Davidson moved that the house concur, and a long debate ensued.

Hon. Judge Savery moved an amendment that the innocent persons be allowed to re-marry. Able arguments were advanced for and against the amendment, and the debate was not concluded when the synod adjourned. The delegates took a trip to Lake St. Joseph this afternoon.


