NEWS FROM HAMILTON.

Extras on Interception. Works Discussed by Sewers Committee—General News Notes.

Hamilton, Aug. 22.—(Special.)—Among the matters discussed at to-night's meeting of the Sewers Committee was the payment of G. M. Ritchie's account for extra on the interception works. He places them at \$1,343.50, while the sub-committee cannot find that the city should pay more than \$773.70.

A THOROUGH THIEF.

Some time Sunday night thieves broke into the home of E. L. Yelch, at 264, Sherbourne-st., and ransacked the house from cellar to garret. Entrance was effected by a rear window, and the thieves passed through the kitchen to the dining room, where a good supply of silverware was found on the sideboard. The invaders took a quantity of clothing which was stored in a cupboard. Not satisfied with this, the thieves rifled a small missionary box, in which a few coppers had been collected from friends by Mrs. Yelch's little daughter. Before departing a visit was paid to the pantry, where everything in the shape of eatables was disposed of. Detective McGrath has been placed on the case, and the police believe that it will not be long before the stolen silverware is recovered, as nearly all of it is marked with the initials "E. Y." or "R. G."

DOWN AT THE DEPOT.

Visitors Come and Go—Tracks Repaired—Proposed Alterations—Car Baiting.

Charles C. Dickson of the United States Mortgage and Trust Company, New York, accompanied by Mrs. Dickson, is holidaying at the residence of his father, Mr. M. C. Dickson, District Passenger Agent of the Grand Trunk.

The C. P. R. tracks about two miles east of Agincourt, which suffered a washout Sunday evening, were fixed in time for the Grand Trunk General Traffic Manager, Reeve, General Superintendent McGulgan, Chief Engineer Hobson and Superintendent Fleming left yesterday morning for Niagara Falls. The new bridge at this place will be inspected. The party will visit Saratoga and, after looking at the tunnel, will go through to Chicago.

The C. P. R. yards south of the station will be enlarged to give more room for new tracks. The sheds now used as bonding buildings will be removed to the extreme south side and several other alterations will be made.

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Mr. W. B. Close, manager of the Toronto Suburban Electric Railway, this afternoon presented a committee from the Weston Village Council in reference to the running of cars in Weston village, but nothing came out of the interview. The cars will stop at the entrance of the village and the people will walk.

The opening meeting of the Dominion prohibition plebiscite campaign in West York was held in the Annet-street Methodist Church to-night. In the absence of Councillor B. Abbott, who is ill, Mr. P. Churche, the chairman of the Dominion Alliance, presided. The chair on the platform with him were Rev. J. W. Has and Rev. W. R. Barker. During the evening large numbers of citizens gave their selections. The chief speaker of the evening was Rev. B. H. Spence of Manitoba, who dwelt upon the importance of the campaign and the will of the electorate in the whole Dominion is to be carried out. He also spoke of the great encouragement the Dominion Alliance has received, and said the outlook never was so favorable.
