

## ARMOUR, C.J., ON LORD'S DAY

Enjoys Taking a Sunday Car and Seeing People Enjoy Themselves Innocently.

## GLASS OF SODA PRONOUNCED GOOD.

Members of the Court of Appeal believe Present Act is Ultra Vires of Provincial Rights.

The argument in the Lord's Day case was resumed yesterday morning in the Court of Appeal. At the opening of the sitting Chief Justice Armour announced that their opinions would only be given as private citizens, and even the Chief Justice expressed a strong personal opinion that the Dominion Parliament should not attempt to enforce the sanctity of the Sabbath. Mr. Peterson continued his argument from yesterday, going into an exhaustive history of the various legislative attempts to enforce the sanctity of the Sabbath. Mr. O'Meara followed, also representing the Crown, and at the adjournment, yesterday afternoon still had the floor.

During the course of the argument, the Chief Justice interrupted many without remark. He placed himself on record as one who enjoyed nothing more than taking a car on a Sunday and going out to a park, there to look upon the people innocently enjoying themselves. He failed to see why a person should not be permitted to go into a drug store or other place and get a glass of soda on Sunday. It certainly would keep that person from going to some dive to fill himself up with whisky.

**Claine Damages.**  
A writ was issued yesterday on behalf of Mrs. Jane Tetsell of Cherttenham, in Peel County, against the Grand Trunk Railway, claiming \$10,000 damages for the death of her husband. The deceased met his death while operating a hand-car, being run into by a train.

**Nipissing Election.**  
Mr. Justice Macdonald yesterday refused an application made by Mr. W. D. McPherson to have the hearing of the Nipissing election petition fixed for Friday postponed. His Lordship, however, intimated that the application might be renewed on Friday at North Bay.

**A Test Case.**  
Judge McDougall submitted a special case for the opinion of one of the justices of the Court of Appeal in the matter of the assessment of one Eliza Leach for sidewalk in front of his property on the north side of College-street. Mr. Leach contends that the lease of his lot, having been granted to his predecessor in title by the University during the currency of the lease in July, 1880, made by the Crown to the city of College-street, is not liable to taxation for local improvements of any kind, because by the conditions of that lease the city agreed with the Crown to maintain and make all the improvements on that portion of College-street at the city's expense.

## ST. LAWRENCE LLOYD'S BILL

Was Reported After Amendments—Only 25 Per Cent. of Capital to Go to Wrecking Plant.

Ottawa, April 3.—At the Banking and Commerce Committee this morning the bill to incorporate the St. Lawrence Lloyds was considered. The capital stock is fixed at five millions, and the incorporators are F. H. Clague, E. V. Clague, P. S. Lewis, H. R. Mackay, Senator Dandridge, Hugh Allan, D. W. Campbell, G. E. Drummond, R. Bedford and John Torrance. They aim to enter into ocean marine insurance and fire, inland marine and transportation insurance, wrecking and to accept aid from any source in the construction of the vessel and works of the company.

After considerable discussion, in which Ministers Tarte, Davies, Pelling and Senator Cox took prominent parts, the preamble was adopted without a division. The first seven clauses were adopted without material amendment.

The amended clause restricting the proportion of capital the company may invest in wrecking plant to 25 per cent. was adopted. The clause giving the company power to receive bonuses and guarantees was struck out as unnecessary, and the bill was reported as amended.

## EXILE PREFERABLE TO PAROLE.

Poor Aquilino Attributes His Capture to American Trickery—What He Thinks of It.

Manila, April 3.—Constance Probel, the daughter of the former chief of the Kallipon Society, has interviewed imprisoned Aquilino. He expressed himself as confused as to what he should do about availing himself of the offer of parole. As to his present position, he said: "By the trickery of the Americans, I was captured. Now that I am a prisoner, I must consider what is best. Liberty and imprisonment would be preferable. I would respect my word, but sometimes I think exile and imprisonment would be preferable. It is said it was only after much persuasion that Aquilino swore allegiance. Aquilino's wife, mother and sister visit him daily."

## TEN KILLED IN RIOT.

Swiss Object to Having Their Grazing Lands Sold by the Municipal Council.

London, April 3.—The Daily Express has received the following from its correspondent at Geneva: "A riot occurred at Bieme, in the Valley de Chamouni, owing to the municipal council selling land on which the people had enjoyed grazing rights. The inhabitants tried to set fire to the town hall, and a fierce conflict ensued between the rioters and the police. Ten persons were killed and fifteen injured."

## Minister Dryden's Dandelions.

Editor World: Year by year for some time it has been found more and more difficult for owners of lawns adjacent to the University and Queen's Park to keep them free from dandelions and other weeds. Every means has been taken to remedy the evil, but without avail, and now a number of these lawns are ruined, and will require re-seeding, but there is not much encouragement to do that, as in a few years they will become as bad as ever.

The trouble began with the University lawn. Those who were present at the presentation of the new colors to the Royal Grenadiers on the 24th of May, 1897, in front of the University, may remember that the lawn on that day, instead of being green, was a bright yellow, so completely was it covered with dandelions, and the crop has thickened each successive season.

The Queen's Park naturally became affected, and the mischief spread to the lawns in the vicinity. What has been said of dandelions applies also to weeds in general, but really more destructive to grass.

Can nothing be done to check this evil? Are the University authorities so careless or indifferent to their duty in this matter, and also those responsible for the care of the Queen's Park, more especially that part north of the Parliament Buildings. I do not know if there is any law compelling people to prevent the spread of these destructive weeds, but there should be. The additional expense incurred in keeping the private lawns above referred to in decent order should be borne by those responsible for the trouble.

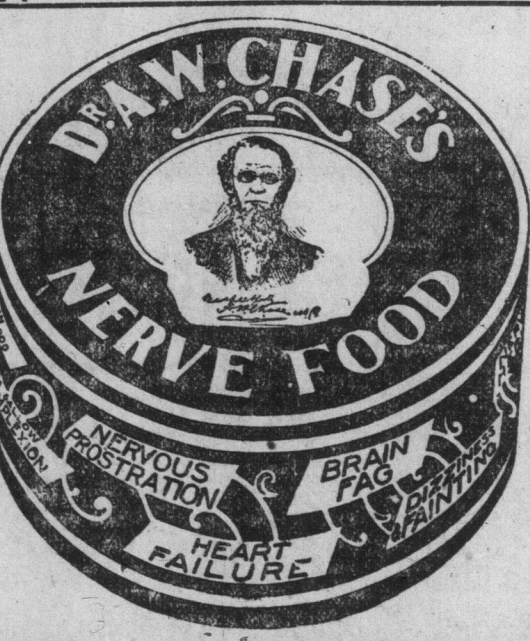

## Hickey was CONVICTED.

George Hickey was convicted before Judge McDougall in the weekly Criminal Court yesterday afternoon of keeping a common gaming house at 178 West King-street, and fined \$75 or two months in jail.

Hickey's store was visited by Inspector Hall shortly before midnight on Feb. 10 last, and besides the keeper seven young men were placed under arrest. The officer seized a few hundred poker chips and several packs of cards, all of which were produced in court yesterday. Samuel Koffman swore that Hickey received a kick off of 10 cents every time a Jack pot was opened. Inspector Hall said that he had placed the place several times previously, and had found a similar poker game in progress. Hickey testified in his own defence. Judge McDougall, in finding the accused guilty, said that this case differed from the prosecution of Jake Saunders some months ago, because there was a fixed rate off without any relation to the amount necessary to pay for the refreshments supplied to the players.

The case of W. G. Lewis, charged with fraudulent use of the mails in connection with the business of the Bon Ton Novelty Company, was before the court at adjournment, and will be concluded this morning.

## CONVICTIONS QUASHED.

Judge McDougall Reverses the Police Magistrate's Decision Regarding Four Druggists.

Judge McDougall yesterday afternoon gave judgment quashing the convictions of the four city druggists, Samuel Hollingsworth, Samuel Howarth, Joseph R. Lee and Herbert V. Burgess, who were fined about two months ago by Magistrate Denison for practicing and profiting to the detriment of the public by prescribing for Minute Warring on Dec. 31 last. In his judgment Judge McDougall says: "I think each of the four convictions is bad upon two grounds, and I do not find it necessary to consider a third objection as there being two of offences disclosed in both the information and conviction, namely, practicing and profiting to the detriment of the public. The conviction directed imprisonment for one month." In reference to the second objection, His Honor held that the conviction only disclosed one act which he finds does not constitute practicing. E. E. A. Du Verney appeared for the appellants, and W. W. Curry, K.C., for Detective Rose, the prosecutor.

Poughkeepsie, N.Y., April 3.—Six trouting horses, valued in all at \$10,000, and owned by Edward E. Perkins of this city, were burned to death in a barn near here early this morning. Incendiarism is suspected. Total loss on barn and horses, \$15,000; insurance, \$7000.

London, April 3.—The authorities of Leicester today began the prosecution of 60,000 defendants under the vaccination acts. Leicester is a hotbed of anti-vaccinationists.
