COUNCILLORS DEFER ACTION

York County Legislators Will Hold Out for Government Money for Good Roads Construction.

CONSTABLES ALLOWED ASSISTANTS

Reward for Constable Stewart Suspended—Other Important Matters Up for Consideration.

The York County Council continued in session at the old court house yesterday, when the agenda was as follows:

Councillor J. D. Evans moved that no action be taken towards partaking in the grant from the Legislature for good roads. The motion was lost, and the matter deferred until a future session.

The grant is made by the Legislature to leading roads; the Legislature grants one-third of the expenditure, the county or local municipality the other two-thirds. Unless a county council pass a resolution to the effect that they do not wish to participate in the grant, the township of the county have no opportunity to apply for this money. It is only when the county has decided to take no action that the reeves and councillors of townships are dealt with. The minor municipalities at York have expressed themselves as opposed to the county taking no action.

When the High Constable's report came up for consideration a discussion ensued on the question of "assistants." High Constable Burns explained the necessity of sending two men, one to accompany the constable, and the other to act as a constable, who was given an opportunity to address the Council, said that county constables on active service objects, and that the county constables were very loath to relinquish their prerogative to expand the money for the county constables. The report of the County on Bylaws and Legislation was read and adopted. It was stated that the bill for High School in towns, withdrawn from the jurisdiction of County Councils, prepared and introduced. The Minister of Education on this matter. We also called the attention of the minister to the unfairness of the county paying for the education of the town withdrawn from the county, to a High School in another town with a town, he agreed with us that this was unfair; but nothing was done in the matter.

The bills re the entrance of suburban railways into the city of Toronto took up a great deal of the time. We advocated the right of these railways to have an entrance into the city for the purpose of carrying freight. We were of the opinion that if the city and companies failed to agree the way to the city, it was left in the control of the Governor-in-Council. This was strongly opposed by the city representatives and the city council, as an infringement of municipal rights, and we noticed that the same parties were quite willing to take the control of freight rates on the Metropolitan Railway away from the city council, and give it to the Governor-in-Council. A clause was put in the Metropolitan bill, providing that when freight traffic increases, the fixing of the rates shall be under the control of the Governor-in-Council. We opposed this, but it carried. The self-proclaimed champions of municipal rights seemed to think the city of Toronto the only municipality whose rights should be protected.

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REVISION OF CANON LAW

Report of Committee of the Protestant Episcopal Church Just Been Made Public.

LAW ON MARRIAGE AND DIVORCE.

New York, June 19.—The joint commission on the revision of the canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church, which was continued by a resolution of the House of Bishops, has just made public its report. The report will be submitted for approval to the next general convention in San Francisco next October.

From Among the Recommended Changes are those which apply to marriage and divorce. Attached to the report, but not incorporated in its text, is the "proposed canon on prohibited degrees," which revises the old discussion of the prohibition against marrying a dead wife's sister. This question has long vexed the laymen in England.
