MORE PAY FOR SCHOOL PRINCIPALS

Board of Education Grants In-
creases of \$100 Each

To Four of the Teaching Staff—A Num-
ber of Changes—Janitor of Richmond
Street North School Appointed.

The board of education last night increased the salaries of four principals \$100 each upon the recommendation of No. 1 committee. Dr. Teasdale presided, and Mrs. Boomer, Dr. English, Dr. Campbell, and Messrs. McRobert, McCormick, Boyle, Wilkins, Weldon, Colerick, Jones, Gillean, Macpherson, Evans, Bayly, Hamilton, Logan, Regan, Secretary McMillan and Inspector Carson were also present.

The report of No. 1 committee was presented by Mr. Bayly. It recommended that Principal Gibbs' salary be fixed at \$800, to date from Jan. 1; that Principal Liddicoat's salary be fixed at \$900, also to date from the first of the year; that Principal Frank Bryant's salary be placed at \$800, to date from January last, and that Principal Downing's salary be advanced to \$700, to date three months back.

The increases in each case were \$100 per year. Trustee Wilkins said the increases should not be dated back. Trustees Gillean and Boyle were opposed to all the increases. Mr. Downing's name was mentioned in particular, and Trustee MacRobert said there must be some unknown motive for such opposition. Some lively cross-firing followed. Trustee Macpherson taking sides with Trustees Boyle and Gillean.

The committee's report was adopted. Applications from Christopher Watson, Wm. Smith, R. McNeil and W. Parker, for the position of janitor of the Richmond street north school were received. The salary is \$100 per year. No. 2 committee, and the board adopted the recommendation.

Miss Minnie McDonnell resigned her position on the staff of the Simcoe street school. Accepted.

Miss M. Harrison and W. J. Snelgrove asked to be placed on the substitute staff. Referred to committee. Inspector Carson recommended that Miss C. M. Howie be transferred from Lorne avenue school to the junior third grade in Simcoe street school, to fill the vacancy by the resignation of Miss M. McDonald; that Miss Jean Black be transferred from the grade she now teaches in Lorne avenue to the grade taught by Miss C. M. Howie; and that Miss E. McMechan be transferred from Part I. grade in Quebec street school to the grade now taught by Miss Jean Black in Lorne avenue school; that Miss L. Hardy, now substituting in West London school, be appointed to the permanent staff as teacher of part I. grade in Quebec street school; that Miss Fannie Steer be appointed substitute from May 1 in West London school until June 30.

Miss Ada Henderson and Miss Mattheus were considered for appointment to the Victoria kindergarten teaching staff. Miss Henderson was given the place on a vote of 9 to 8.

Miss Kate Laidlaw was appointed to succeed Miss Henderson at Rectory street kindergarten.

REV. ALEX. McMILLAN

Lectures on "Hero Martyrs of the
Scottish Reformation."

Rev. Alex. McMillan, of Toronto, lectured in the Auditorium last night on "Hero Martyrs of the Scottish Reformation." The attendance was not large, but those present enjoyed a rich treat. Rev. W. J. Clark, of the First Presbyterian Church, presided. Mr. McMillan opened by describing the town of St. Andrews, in Scotland, and he then went on to tell something of the important relation the town had with the history of the reformation. The first of the martyrs spoken of by Mr. McMillan was John Wesley, educated by John Wyckliffe at Oxford, and the second, and no less courageous, was Paul Cramer, a Bohemian, who was educated in English universities, and exerted a great influence upon the people of Scotland. Patrick Hamilton, the third of the martyrs, was described by the lecturer as a young man of a very rare type and noble birth—a great-grandson of one of the kings of Scotland—whose thirst for knowledge had carried him to German and French universities, and who was condemned for "infamous heresy" in 1527. George Wishart, the last of the quartet of martyrs, entered St. Andrews eighteen or nineteen years after the martyrdom of Hamilton, and was hanged and burned on the same charge as that on which Hamilton was condemned.

On motion of Mr. Robert Reid and Rev. J. G. Stuart, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the lecturer. The lecture was given under the auspices of the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A.
