LAST STAND OF THE HURONS

Interesting Addresses Delivered Before
Ontario Historical Society.

Professor John Deerness represented
the London and Middlesex Historical
Society at the Provincial Historical
Society meetings held recently at Col-
lingwood and on one of the Christian
Islands. He reported that the meeting
was one of great success, which was
greatly due to the efforts of Messrs.
Morris, Williams, Freer (formerly of
this city), and Major Bruce, the officer
of the Huron Institute. Standing on
the elevator of one of the crumbling
bastions, Mr. John Deerness, K. C., deliv-
ered an address to a large audience
composed of both whites and Indians,
which was without doubt the most im-
pressive event of the meeting. His sub-
ject was, "The Last Stand of the
Hurons." The scene of the lecture was
very appropriate with the lecturer on
the remains of the last fort built by the
Hurons and Jesuits.

Mr. Deerness gave a graphic descrip-
tion of a warfare which was without
parallel in cruelty, treachery, and fer-
ocity, and which eventually ended in
the almost complete extermination of
more than thirty thousand Hurons
along with their neighbors. The Hurons,
a semi-agricultural tribe of Indians,
strong in numbers, had been plundered
driven from their homes, and finally
corralled on this island by the ferocious
Iroquois. Without food and without
shelter was the condition in which the
remains of 1648-9 found them and scores
of them died from hunger every day.

To this day the remains of the last fort
built by the Hurons are plainly trace-
able. The little stream of water com-
ing from within its walls, still trickles
down to the lake shore.

**A FIERCE STORM
VISITS SARNIA**

Wind Reached Velocity of 61
Miles an Hour - Fall of
28 in Temperature.

Sarnia, July 23.—Considerable alarm
was caused by the windstorm which
passed over this section at 3:30 o'clock
Sunday afternoon. The wind attained
a velocity of between 60 and 61 miles
an hour and the temperature dropped
28 degrees in half an hour. Scores of
small boats were on the river and lake
when the storm came up and many had
great difficulty in reaching shore. Some
of the large craft were obliged to drop
anchor. A party of Sarnia and Strath-
roy people had a most exciting experi-
ence while out in a gasoline launch
abreast of Weesbeach. In the party
were Mr. and Mrs. Pincombe, Mr.
and Mrs. D. C. Ross, Mrs. E. J. Malone,
Mr. and Mrs. Davis and about twenty
others, including women and children.
When the storm overtook them they
were about eight miles above Wees-
beach. The lake was lashed into a
fury and the launch was headed full
speed for shore. Fortunately everybody
got ashore without any injury, but all
were drenched.

The steamer King Edward had a
rough experience on Lake Huron in the
storm. The steamer was nearly four
hours late in arriving at Goderich, but
beyond the passengers receiving a se-
vere fright, no other injury resulted.

On shore damage was done to tents,
awnings, and a few trees were uprooted.
The storm lasted about an hour.

The funeral of the late J. G. McCrae
took place Sunday afternoon from the
family residence, 138 north Vidal street,
to Lakeview Cemetery. The service at
the house and at the grave was con-
ducted by Rev. J. J. Patterson, of St.
Andrew's Presbyterian Church. The
pallbearers were Messrs. John Mitchell,
John Dalziel, R. E. L. Dwyer, D. N. Mor-
rison, Wm. Lawrence and Henry Ingram.
Thomas Farwell has been arrested
here by Detective Murray. Farwell is
wanted at Wallaceburg on a charge of
seduction, and was taken to that place.
J. L. Ellery, local manager for the
Gourlay, Winter and Leeming Company,
was hurt today by a piano falling over
his leg.

**CRESCUS REFUSES
TO RACE ANY MORE**

Famous Trotter Can't Be In-
duced to Work for Any One
But Old Friend Ketchum.

New York, July 23.—Crescus, 2:02 1/4,
the world's champion trotting stallion,
now owned by M. W. Savage, of Min-
neapolis, who bought the horse for
\$21,000 at an auction sale in this city,
has positively refused to be trained or
given any fast work by E. C. Hersey,
who trains for Savage.

The Minneapolis man is also the
owner of Dan Patch, 1:55 1/4, the pacing
king, and it was his intention to exhibit
the two horses throughout the country
at prominent race meets and country
fairs. Hersey figured that Crescus had
more than an even chance to reduce
his record this year.

George H. Ketchum, of Toledo, Ohio,
who bred, owned and trained Crescus,
received word from Savage recently to
the effect that Crescus had refused to
be trained, and he asked Ketchum if
he would take a trip to Minneapolis.
The latter promptly acceded to this
request, and upon reaching the Minne-
apolis town, Savage and Hersey explained
the exact conditions to him.

Upon reaching the luxurious home
provided for Crescus, Ketchum went
to the stall door and it required but
one call of his voice for the champion
trotter to recognize the man who had
driven him in his many wonderful per-
formances, and the horse gave every
evidence of pleasure upon again seeing
Ketchum.

After having the harness put on the
trotter, Ketchum got in the sulky and
jogged him and worked him for sev-
eral slow heats, the horse performing
in his usual prompt and cheerful man-
ner and apparently taking pleasure in
showing his former trainer that he still
retained the speed and manners which
earned him his championship honor.

After giving Crescus several heats,
Ketchum requested Hersey to take the
reins and work the horse a mile, but
the latter had no sooner got into the
sulky than the great trotter refused to
be led or driven onto the track, and he
continued to suik until Ketchum again
took the reins.

When Ketchum was asked to explain
Crescus' remarkable actions, he turned
to Savage and said:
"I understand Mr. Savage, that the
early years of your life were devoted
to constant and strenuous toil, and that
year in and year out you devoted all of
your time to business duties. Strictly
now that you have acquired sufficient
means to enable you to gradually with-
draw from the more active and exacting
details of business life, how would you
relish giving up the present mode
of existence and going back to the labor
and humdrum of your earlier man-
hood?"

"Crescus, ever since his 2-year-old
form, has had one of the most strenu-
ous careers of any harness horse living,
meeting and defeating the crack trot-
ters every year for five seasons, re-
peatedly lowering the world's records,
and being shipped thousands of miles from
coast to coast. He has performed over
all kinds of tracks and proved himself
the gamest, fastest, most consistent
trotter that the world has ever seen."

"After seven years of such perform-
ances he went into retirement with all
the laurels that have ever been ac-
quired a trotter, and to be asked to
step into the limelight of the trotting
world again and repeat what he con-
sidered was a matter of historic record
has undoubtedly influenced the old
horse to refuse."
