Sits at "\$60 a Month" to Give Out-T. W. Foster Alias J. C. Harvey Arrested.

Last week Mr. George Bell, of this city, answered an "ad" in an Ottawa newspaper, which asked for agents for the "Canadian Homestead," an alleged newspaper. The "ad" advised applicants to send 30 cents for a canvasser's outfit, and after appointment they were to receive \$60 per month or work on commission. The letters were addressed to a box in the postoffice at the capi-Mr. Bell collected two or three subscriptions, but consulted the police here about the matter, and they referred him to Chief Powell, of Ottawa. Inquiry was made, and the fact ascertained that the "Canadian Homestead" was not listed, and therefore not entitled to pass the postal authoriressels under his command ties. Detective Flannigan was placed on the case, and arrested J. C. Harvey, who has been a resident of Ottawa about a month, on suspicion, and charged him with fraud. When arrested, Harvey said there were 2,000 copies of his paper on the way from New York, but they have not arrived. A copy of the paper was found on him. It was dated "Ottawa, Ont., No. 898, Vol. IV." and contained not a line of Canadian news, but merely love and Klondike stories of a cold character. The letters found on the prisoner prove him to be T. W. Foster, of Dover, New Hampshire, where his wife lives, and to whom he sent money. Harvey, alias Foster, it is alleged, was to have been married on Monday last to a widow in Ottawa, to whom he represented himself as a man of fabulous wealth and the owner of orange groves. He is being held at the capital. Chief Williams received a communication from Police Commissioner Major Sharman, of Ottawa, this morning, that Bell and other parties must appear as
