KING CARLOS AND HIS SON SHOT TO DEATH AT LISBON

The Portuguese Monarch and Crown Prince Brutally Murdered in the Streets of the Capital.

QUEEN AMELIE WAS A WITNESS TO THE SLAUGHTER

Bloody Deed Charged To the Revolutionaries-Prince Manuel Wounded, But Is at Once Proclaimed King-Police Run Down and Slay Three of the Regicides

Lisbon, Feb. 1. - King Carlos and Crown Prince Luiz Philippe were assassinated today.

They were shot to death while seated in the royal carriage at Lisbon just after their return from Villa Vicosa, where they had been sojourning, by a band of men, who fired a volley from carbines.

The royal family was driving in an open carriage, when a group of men at the corner of Praca do Commercio and the Ruo do Arsenal, suddenly sprang toward the carriage, and, leveling carbines, which they had concealed upon them, fired, mortally wounding the king and crown prince, and slightly woulding the king's second son, Prince Manuel.

Queen Amelia, who rose in the carriage and tried to shield the crown prince, was unhurt. Immediately the police guard stired on the regicides, killing three of them.

7,361,356 PERSONS CARRIED BY STREET RAILWAY IN 1907

A Million More Than in 1906-Traffic and Recip's Show Big Increase Over All Former Years - The Earnings By Routes.

The directors of the London Street Railway Company, who meet next week, will have a cheerful annual statement to present to the shareholders. The year 1907 was the best one in the company's history. The ratio of growth in traffic, receipts and profits shows that a street railway, when well managed, is bound to become increasingly remunerative with the growth and prosperity of the community.

The conditions in London are especially favorable, because the city is spread over so large an area. Practically every new resident becomes a regular patron of the street railway, as it is difficult to secure houses within easy walking distance of the business section.

The effect of the growth of the outlying portions of the city is seen in the remarkable increase in the number of street railway passengers in the past two or three years, particularly last year, when the company carried nearly a million more people than in 1906. It is remarkable that last year the company carried three times as many passengers as in 1896. The figures
