NO SUNDAY DELIVERY TO MILK CONDENSER BY BURNSIDE FARMERS

Unanimously Decide Against Breaking Sabbath at a Special Meeting.

PUTNAM, July 7.—The patrons of the Burnside branch of the Borden Condensed Milk Company are not in favor of delivery of milk on Sunday. They went on record unanimously to this effect at a meeting held at the factory when a motion by J. Francis, seconded by R. McVicar, went through without dissent.

The necessity of food conservation during the war measure was put forward by R. B. Hutt of the Borden factory at Ingersoll. All had found it necessary to change their methods of living to aid in winning the war, he said, and the food control act made one liable for the loss of food. The company had lost large quantities of milk and to overcome this had decided on Sunday delivery.

It was not necessary to deliver milk on Sunday, but the company would not have the milk on the day following. No hardship was put on the farmer, the proposal being only intended for the hot weather, or until about the end of September, when the night delivery meant the breaking of the Sabbath for the factory hands.

As the present demand for condensed milk continued Saturday night and Sunday morning milk would not be made in time to deliver in reply to a question by Frank Atkins.

He also replied to W. Brumpton that the factory would not cook Sunday morning's milk.

James Francis said that as much money had been made from cheese and pigs as at the condensing factory, with no Sunday delivery.

James Rath thought the condenser a waste, "Cheese and hogs beat it all to pieces," he added.

Shannon brought forward the question of Sunday work from the hired man's standpoint, while Dugal McVicar asked whether breaking the Sabbath was helping to win the war, granted saving milk products was.

Rev. Mr. Herbert spoke regarding the danger in the present proposal of lowering our moral standard.

H. Longfield said if the condenser wanted the milk on Sunday he thought they would have to have it. The motion that those present were not in favor of Sunday delivery of milk was then put and carried unanimously. H. Matthews suggested that a committee be formed in conjunction with the Borden Condensed Milk Company, moved that a committee be formed to look after the interests of the patrons of Burnside, and named the following: H. Matthews, F. Atkins, Charles Rath, Dugal McVicar, George Huntley.

Owing to lack of interest the meeting dispersed without a vote being taken on this motion.

H. Matthews was chairman, being proposed by R. McVicar and James O'Neill, while Charles R. Boulding was secretary, proposed by G. Boxall and F. Atkins.

FIREMEN'S CASE TO BE PREPARED THIS EVENING

A special committee of the trades and labor council and the Firemen's union will meet tonight to decide what representations are to be made to the special committee of Mayor C. R. Somerville, Controller C. H. Merryfield and Ald. F. E. Harley, appointed by the council to deal with the case.

Mayor Somerville will not be back until Tuesday night, and the other members of the committee will leave consideration of the case until he returns. By that time, it is said, the firemen will have the details of their case in shape to back up their request that they be granted a conciliation board.
