GOES TO PRISON FOR LONG TERM

Irish Agitator Is Sentenced to From Five to Ten Years.

CRIMINAL ANARCHY

Precautions Were Taken To Prevent Any Demonstration.

New York, Mya 3-Extraordinary preautions were taken today when James . Larkin, Irish agitator, convicted of criminal anarchy, was sentenced from five to ten years in the state prison at hard labor.

Larkin, who clashed several times rith the court while conducting his own efence, took his sentence quietly. Bowing to Justice Weeks, he said: "! thank you, sir."

Names and addresses of spectators were taken at the door of the court-room. Men were searched. Several were excluded for attempting a holswere excluded for attempting a boisterious demonstration; one young woman was rebuked by the court when she rose and attempted to take Larkin's hand as he was led away.

Called to the bar, the woman said: "I simply rose, thinking I would be permitted to show respect in that manner for the man for whom perhaps I have more respect than any other. I thought I would be allowed to rise as one does for the judge of the court."

Rumor of Furchase Finds **Neither Confirmation Nor** Denial.

Ottawa, May 3.—The rumored adquisition by the agrarian interests of the Toronto World finds neither denial nor confirmation among members of that party at Ottawa. The general feeling, however is that any negotiations to that end would be opened from the publication centre of the grain growers at Winnipeg. During the past year the Grain Growers' Guide has been extending its influence and efforts have been made to establish a publication of similar nature in the Maritime Provinges. In Ontario the Farmers' Sun, while a strong' advocate of the farmers' interests, is not directly affillated with the grain growers' movement. It is therefore considered quite probable that an effort may be made to obtain a daily in Toronto, whose functions would be to preach the gospel of the farmers throughout Ontario. There is a further rumor that the Liberals may endeavor to secure the paper, but in best-informed circles this is not considered at all likely.

HUIRT SAID TO HAVE **CONFESSED KILLING** OF CANADIAN WOMAN

Angeles Reports Further Admissions.

Los Angeles, May 3.—In a second alleged confession, which officers were checking today, Walter Andrew Watchecking today, Walter Andrew Watson, alias James R. Huirt, admitted killing a Canadian woman he had married, but whose name he could not remember, according to Thomas Lee Woolwine, district attorney who said the confession was made to him yesterday. This made five women the man was declared to have admitted slaying. The district attorney said Watson told him he had married the woman in Tacoma, Wash. and that he choked her and pushed her overboard while they were boating on Lake Washington, near Seattle. He was quoted as saying he then rowed ashore, leaving the woman's body in the water.

"Naturally, I told no one about it," the district attorney quoted him.
Woolwine said his investigation showed that Watson married Miss Beatrice Andrewatha, a Canadian, in Tacoma on February 6, 1919, and thut she was said to be missing. He said he had advised Washington authorities of Watson's statement. Mrs. Beatrice Andrewatha is the third Canadian woman among Watson's alleged victims. The other two are listed as "missing."

New York, May 3.—Evidence that Banjamin Binkowitch, the bank mes-senger who was stabbed to death at Milford, Conn., last August, after he had disappeared with \$178,000 worth of stolen securities, was killed by a hire assassin because he refused to turn ove the securities for \$3.000. was developed it was learned today, through informa twas learned today, through information obtained at secret meetings held before United States Commissioner Alexander Gilchrist here last month in connection with the bankruptcy case against Nicholas Arnstein, a fugitive from jujstice.

The plot was hatched, according to information received by the police in information received by the police, in the apartment of a Cleveland gambler in the theatrical district here two days after the messenger disappeared. Binkowitch was living with friends in an east side tenement house. He is alleged to be a proper side of the to have been lured from his hidingplace by the murderers, who induced him to accompany them in a limousine to Milford, where they claimed to have a purchaser for the stolen bonds.

Binkowitch, according to the report, went to a hotel in Milford, where he remained with the men who were to kill

him several days.

Stabbed in Back. On the night before the murder, Binkowitch, the evidence as made pubic says, was aroused about dawn, and with the assassins got into an automobile, ostensibly to meet the man who was to purchase the securities from him. He is alleged to have boasted about having the securities hidden in the lining of his coat. the lining of his coat.

The automobile containing Binkowitch and the assassins started through the Milford turnpike. When about two miles from the town one of the assassins is alleged to have pulled young Binkowitch from his seat, while the other plunged a knife into his back. He was then thrown out of the car into a clump of bushes, where his body was found three days later. The murderers then are reported to have stopped the car about a half-mile from the scene and to have walked back to the body. Binko-

Buffalo Man 'Acquitted After New Trial.
