PROBE OF POLICE DEPT.

Mayor Donnelly Asserts Blame

Rests With Ontario License Commission.

WINDSOR, July 2.—Confronted with the demand that he put into writing his charges regarding the liquor traffic in this city, and associated with the Essex borer, and particularly within the confines of the town of Sandwich, was the Hon. Chappell House, Sandwich roadhouse, as made verbally before the town council recently, and after a space of some days, and before the attack, today declared that he would wait for a subterfuge had passed.

If the council wanted his charges in writing, he would have them, but he has never been so informed at the time he and other citizens supporting him were in the hall, and the investigation of the minister stated today.

"My charges are very simple," he declared, "and I am not at all aware of the fact that undesirable conditions exist in Sandwich, which are known to the police and the public."

Solicitor John Sale, who was taken into consultation by the police commission, had advice against a public hearing, on the ground that the protest will be more or less in the nature of a petition, and that it is the duty of the police department, Chief Master and members of which are alleged to be in the process of prosecuting the Chappell House.

In an interview issued today, Mayor McLean said that he was not a member of the police department, declaring that he was not responsible for any of the blame, if any, for lack of an enforcement of the liquor laws, and that he was a member of the Ontario License Commission, in that it was the Ontario temperance act, a provincial measure, and not a municipal one.
