BIG WRECKING CREW WORK LONG AND HARD

One Hundred and Twenty Ton Engine Goes Over Thirty Foot Bank—Suburban News.

EAST TORONTO, Nov. 29.—The unfortunate negligence by a blind switch in the extreme easterly end of the York G.T.R. yards, was on Saturday morning left open, allowing one of the big motor engines, tender and five cars to topple down a 30-foot embankment, and gave the York auxiliary a strenuous 40 hours work.

At 4.10 on Saturday morning G.T.R. engine No. 747 pulling 39 loaded freight cars crashed thru the stop block a mile and a half east of the station, and while Engineer Kerr and his fireman, Albert Brown, miraculously escaped, the engine and tender plunged to the bottom.

It was found necessary, in view of the enormous weight of the big motor, 120 tons, to send to Hamilton for a powerful steam derrick, and on Saturday afternoon the work of raising was begun. More than 100 Italian laborers worked on the job and about 9 o'clock on Sunday No. 747 was brought to the top of the bank, placed on the rails and later towed into the round house. While the locomotive, which has only been six months in commission, is not badly damaged, the tender is smashed beyond repair. When placed on the rails 40 hours after taking the plunge fire was still smoldering.

Liverpool wheat futures closed today unchanged to 3-8 higher than yesterday, while corn remained unchanged.

At Chicago, December wheat closed 1-8 lower than yesterday, December corn closed 1-8 lower, and December oats closed 1-8 lower than yesterday.
