## WHAT I SAW IN JUNE, 1866

Recollections of D. H. Bastedo, Late No. 5 Co., Q.O.R.

Times were pretty dull in Toronto, about the close of the American War in 1864. There was very little business doing, no enterprise and no money. Two businesses in which I was employed suspended, and vacancies were very scarce, so I made my way to a employment with varied success until June 1866.

For some months previous to this date, my attention had been called to a body of armed men who drilled evenings, on one of the public streets. They were said to be Fenians, and their object was stated to be an "attack on Canada." I could scarcely believe that this was a fact, and in the month of May I noticed an increase of numbers who drilled, and also that a number of southerners, joined the ranks of these men seemed to be old soldiers, and while not so smart in their drill as British regulars, they were correct in their volley firing.

While the officers seemed to be very clever, the movement became so confused that a number of young Canadian residents of the city were the habit of meeting and talking the matter over and of returning to Canada week in May. We observed that a large number of strange men had arrived, and headquarters were opened. I think on Union Square, and great activity prevailed.

I was the youngest of our party (one of whom was a military school man) and I felt very nervous. I was in some of our friends in Toronto of the state of affairs, but this was discouraged, and we were assured that there would be no raid, and that the authorities in Toronto were fully posted.

On the night of the first of June, we had a meeting, and while we were to be shot at, as crossing was strictly forbidden. As soon as it became daylight, I looked around and found a large number of wounded men, and about a hundred Fenians, the Canadians were volunteers who had come down from Port Colborne on the tug "Rock."

The detachment numbered about eighty men, under Col. Dennis. On report that the Fenian force of about eight hundred men, returning from Ridgeway (see foot note), they boldly marched up the River-road, and on meeting the enemy, immediately opened fire. The Fenians were strictly forbidden. As soon as it became daylight, I looked around and found a large number of wounded men, and about a hundred Fenians, the Canadians were volunteers who had come down from Port Colborne on the tug "Rock."

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Parties who witnessed this fight said the Canadians were the bravest of the brave, and one, an old American captain, who had been in over a hundred battles, stated "that he never saw such reckless bravery," and that the Canadians did not know when they were beaten. As a result of the fight, I saw seven or nine Fenians buried on the morning of the 3rd, some of whom died from bayonet wounds. About 11 a.m. the Fenians were placed and well handled could have inflicted great loss on the enemy and possibly prevented their embarkation.

RUSSIAN SUSPECT DISCHARGED. COMO, Italy, June 21.—Constantinopoli, the Russian who had been detained in connection with the mysterious murder of Mrs. Porter Charlton, whose body was found packed in a trunk fished out of Lake Como, has been discharged.

A \$500 Controversy. An interesting controversy is being indulged in on the upper lakes in connection with the relative speed of the "Huron" of the Northern Navigation Co. and the "Keewatin" of the C.P.R.

It is claimed by the latter that it has demonstrated she could speed faster than the "Huron," and the "Huron" "Canadian" has offered to wager two of its contemporaries that it could beat the "Huron" in a race. The "Keewatin" or the "Assiniboia" of the C.P.R. line will pass these vessels, and in good faith has deposited a certified cheque for \$500.

2500 Ex-Members Registered. About 150 ex-members of the Queen's Own Rifles registered at headquarters yesterday. In all about 2500 have reported.

It is estimated that the reunion will cost about \$25,000. The pageant scenery cost more than \$15,000. It was specially painted in England. The costumes were loaned by the British Government. John Henderson, the pageant master, received \$2000 for his services. He has been here about two months. The salaries for all the employees will amount to about \$4000.

The ex-members were treated to a free car ride around the city yesterday. The Queen's Own will probably participate in the celebration that is to be held at Halifax on the arrival of the cruiser Niobe, August 22.

A Dig for Roosevelt. LONDON, June 21.—Sidney Buxton, president of the board of trade, opened the international congress of chambers of commerce to-day.

Referring to the differences in national fiscal systems, Mr. Buxton concluded his comment on this subject with the remark: "But not being an ex-president of the United States, I am not going to tell you how to run your show."

**German Princess Dead.**

KARLSRUHE, June 21.—Princess Federica of Schleswig-Holstein, the youngest sister of Emperor Augustus of Victoria, died suddenly to-day from heart failure. The princess was born July 3, 1874.
