WHAT I SAW IN JUNE, 1866

Recollections of D. H. Bastedo, Late No. 5 Co., Q.O.R.

n 1864. There was very little business doing, no enterprise and no money. Two businesses in which I was employed suspended, and vacancies were very scarce, so I made my way to a U. S. border city, where I found employment with varied success until June 1866.

I was the youngest of our party (one of whom was a military school man) and I urged wiring the authorities or some of our friends in Toronto of the state of affairs, but this was discouraged, and we were assured that there would be no raid, and that the authorities in Toronto were fully posted.
On the night of the first of June, we

had a meeting, and while we were together, we heard what we were informed was the roll of the ammunition
wagons going down Niagara-street to
the river, yet it was stated that no
raid would take place, a statement I believed to my everlasting regret. The following evening it was reported that the Fenians had crossed into Canada, and that two engagements had taken place, one at Ridgeway, and one at

On receiving this information, I im mediately made my way to the river, which I found was patrolled by U. S. troops and sailors, and it was not until 2 a.m. that I was able to get a man to row me over the river to the Canadian side, which cost me \$5—I only had about \$7 in my possession—the boatman being averse to taking the risk of man being averse to taking the risk of being shot at, as crossing was strictly forbidden. As soon as it became daylight, I looked around and found a house containing a number of wounded men. Canadians and Fenians; the Canadians were volunteers who had come down from Port Colborne on the tug "Robb," that day.

I could scarcely believe that this was a fact, but in the month of May I noticed an increase of numbers who drilled, and also that a number of smart soldierly men, whom I took for southerners, joined the ranks, All of these men seemed to be old soldiers, and while not so smart in their drill as British regulars, they were correct in their volley firing.


