

## SUGGESTION FOR UNDRAWN POULTRY SALE

Revision of City Market By-Laws at Export Club Session

ADDRESSES GIVEN AT MEETING HERE

Live Stock and Other Important Topics Are Taken Up

What had already been done by the Federal and Provincial Governments to aid agriculture and what help could be given by the New Brunswick Export Club to increase production in the province, so far as poultry and live stock was concerned, was told to members of the club this morning by representatives of the Dominion and Provincial departments of agriculture.

The city might devise its market by-laws to allow the sale of undrawn poultry, that the selling of graded eggs be compulsory and that the citizens generally might help by calling for graded eggs, were suggestions of the poultry experts and the club was asked to aid in bringing these changes about.

W. S. Fisher presided and among those present were A. E. Massie, L. W. Simms, A. F. Blake, H. C. Schofield, E. A. Schofield, P. R. Fairweather, R. G. Betancourt, Cuban consul, and J. A. Kennedy.

Mr. Fisher, president of the club, welcomed the representatives of the Federal and Provincial agricultural departments and assured them the Export Club was desirous of co-operation fully in solving the market problems of the farmer and realized this could be done only by co-operation.

### POULTRY MATTERS

The first subject discussed was that of poultry production and marketing, and the discussion was opened by George Wilson, Federal poultry promoter. He congratulated the club on the move made and said it was a good thing when the business men of the country took an interest in the problems of the farmer. Last year, he said, New Brunswick used 8,000,000 dozen eggs, and produced only 4,000,000 dozen. The province had some of the best laying stock in the Dominion, and with proper encouragement the production could be greatly increased.

Mr. Simms asked if the men who were going into the business of egg producing in an efficient manner were making money, and Mr. Wilson said they were and could meet any competition from outside, but the greatest trouble was that most of the farmers did not take the hen seriously.

### SAYS DISADVANTAGE

Mr. Wilson said the provincial poultry men were under a disadvantage because of the regulation against the sale of undrawn poultry, as this could not be sent to other markets when the market here was glutted. The sale of undrawn poultry in the Dominion, he said, was the responsibility of the producer, who received more per bird, and the consumer, who received a better and more reliable fowl. He believed the sale of undrawn poultry would be one of the biggest factors in increasing production.

F. L. Wood, provincial poultry superintendent, told of what had been done by the department to encourage better stock, started in 1918, and of the success it had met with, and of the aid given the poultry men in having their flocks culled and the non-producers wiped out. Since then there had been a decided improvement in the quality of the hens. He had found that all classes of farmers were interested in the improvement of their flocks.

### POULTRY EXCHANGE

The work of the New Brunswick Poultry Exchange and its place in increasing production were told by A. R. Jones, manager. The exchange had now 60 circles and 1,000 members but their work was handicapped by the selling of ungraded eggs. He suggested that people ask for eggs by the grade, when they would get a better article and encourage the man who is trying to produce the best. The quality of New Brunswick eggs and poultry was as good as anywhere and when the home market was supplied there was a good chance to export the surplus. He also advocated hatcheries to sell day old chicks, as in this way it would be possible for the farmer to

## PRODUCTION GAINS

Mr. Wilson said that since the suggestion of Mr. Wilson that the market regulations be changed to allow for the sale of undrawn poultry, he said that now Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were working together in marketing.

James Bremner, provincial live stock superintendent, said the department had horse, cattle, sheep and swine, under their care. The number of horses was decreasing but the quality was better and the grades were being gradually forced out by the pure breeds.

On the growth of the cattle depended the sheep and swine industry and it was on this line the efforts of the department were mainly centred. Through a system of bonusing pure bred bulls, according to a standard of performance, there had been a big improvement in the stock of the province, in 1926 the number of pure bred bulls being 38 and last year it had increased to 137.

One result of this had been to secure for the local breeders the business of supplying pure bred sires, and it was only when the demand exceeded the supply that bulls were brought in from outside.

The department had under consideration the starting of several calf clubs in the province, and these were expected to interest the young people on the farms in good stock.

### BEEF CATTLE

Mr. Fisher asked if there was any good reason why beef cattle could not be raised in New Brunswick to compete with western beef, and Mr. Bremner said the best man to ask was one who had been in the business, but he was inclined to think New Brunswick could not compete with the west where they did not have to feed hay for as many months as we did here.

Touching on sheep, he said the quality was steadily increasing, and the aim of the department was to get the farmers to raise either Oxford or Shropshire. They were also handling the wool for the farmers and selling it co-operatively for them. As one method of encouraging sheep-growing he advocated more sheep fairs.

In swine the department were concentrating on Yorkshires, and the farmers were gradually swinging into line with this breed. The boy and girl swine clubs had been a great help in increasing the interest in growing good pigs and it was planned to extend this work.

## C. P. R. BOOTH AT EXHIBITION IS HOLDING CROWDS

Fine Arrangement Gives Visitors Idea of World-wide Travel Scope

Thousands of people who visited the Exhibition yesterday paused to gaze and then stayed to study and admire the display made in a Canadian Pacific Railway booth on the main floor near the central exit to the grounds.

The booth is a large one, representing the C. P. R., has been represented at the Saint John fair by an exhibit dealing with its transportation business and facilities, and the return to a place among the exhibitors has certainly been most effectively accomplished.

The booth is a large one running down the eastern wall of the main building. It is artistically planned and nicely lighted. Along the front are shown a series of views of some of the outstanding places of attraction to tourists along its far-flung line in Canada. These are arranged as transparencies, lights behind the pictures making the scenes stand out boldly and beautifully. Along the back wall of the booth are arranged more scenes. These are larger and are so made that they stand out in relief, presenting the actual appearance of the places shown. At a trail in one of the larger panels, depicting a scene in the Rockies, figures on horseback actually appear to be riding across the scene. The lighting effects are so arranged that they fade and reappear, giving a dramatic effect.

The view along the front of the booth includes Saint John Harbour, Vancouver, Victoria, B. C., the Parliament Buildings in Victoria, B. C., the Hotel R. C. Empress Hotel at Victoria, K. B. C., Lake MacArthur, Lake O'Hara, Mirror Lake, Banff Springs Hotel, and its splendid golf course, the Duke of Connaught at Banff, and the C. P. R. liner Montclair at Liverpool.

In addition to the views, there is an office with the representatives of the company in attendance. This exhibit forms part of the C. P. R. display at Toronto, and also of the one that was taken to New Zealand, as well as its splendid collection of its that might not attract the eye but is well worth viewing if the thought of the buffalo heads and the enormous, shaggy heads of the bison give the spectators some idea of the size of the country. Nominations today will officially close at 2 p. m. standard time. Prospective candidates may file their nominations through their respective agents at any time within the two hours allotted, but as a rule the papers are handed in immediately after the stroke of 12, in order to give the candidates and their supporters a good opportunity to address the audience.
