

BOYS GIVEN TREAT

Groups of Scouts and Wolf Cubs Hear Interesting Lectures

Lectures for groups of Boy Scouts and groups of Wolf Cubs had large audiences last night and were much appreciated. About 40 Scouts, members of No. 1, St. Andrews; No. 7, Stone church, and No. 13, Young Judeans, met in the Y. M. H. A. hall and listened with great interest to the excellent address on electricity given by B. Faraday. Scoutmaster Eli Boyer was in charge. The Scouts heartily thanked the lecturer.

The boys afterwards held a joint Scout meeting that was a great success. There were 62 of the Wolf Cubs, representing No. 1, Knox; No. 2, St. Paul's, and No. 17, Trinity packs, that met in the Natural History Society rooms and enjoyed the illustrated lecture on birds given by Dr. William Macintosh. Dr. Macintosh regaled his audience with much bird lore and several Indian legends and afterwards took the Cubs on a tour of the museum building. L. L. Johnson, assistant commissioner for Wolf Cubs, was in charge. The boys showed their delight and appreciation in their hearty cheers.

The Scouts and Cubs of the city have been divided into groups and Mr. Faraday and Dr. Macintosh are repeating their addresses to the various groups.

Health Training In Business Is Urged

LONDON, Dec. 10 — "Success in work demands training in health as well as in your job, and you must have some hobby."

This was one of a number of original hints on how to keep healthy while working in a city office that were given by Sir Bruce Bruce-Porter, the famous physician, in a luncheon lecture at the Bishopgate Institute recently.

Dr. Bruce urged the necessity of anyone practicing deep breathing exercises regularly, and added: "It would not be a bad plan if an office manager with a complete inter-office telephone system by his elbow occasionally left his chair and went to the top of the building to fetch what he wanted himself, instead of ringing for an office boy. He might then take the opportunity to do some deep breathing exercises by the way."

ASKS DISMISSAL OF 3 N. B. VENDORS

Moncton Presbytery Charges New Appointees Are Liquor Law Violators

MONCTON, Dec. 9.—At a meeting of the Moncton Presbytery in Saint John's church here tonight the following resolution regarding the enforcement of the Prohibition Act was adopted:

"Whereas, the press of our province, particularly the Temperance Bulletin of December 1, 1925, states that three recently appointed vendors are noted as violators of the Prohibition Act and that against these three men, the said Bulletin states, there is a list of convictions for violations of the liquor law; therefore,

"Resolved, that we, the Presbytery of Moncton, of the United Church of Canada, in session December 9, 1925, in Saint John's United church, Moncton, N.B., in view of the facts above stated and the necessity of maintaining respect for law, very respectfully ask that the appointment of these men be cancelled."

Copies of the resolution were ordered forwarded to the Premier of the province and to the press.

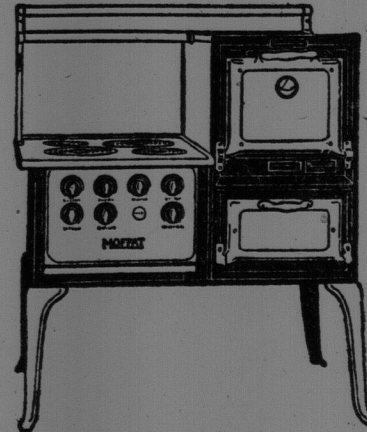

It was resolved to ask the newly organized church at McAdam to join the fourth district.

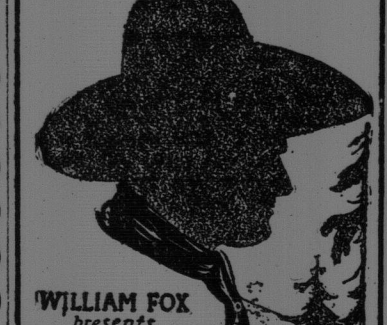
