MORE STRENGTH IN TEXTILE PRICES

(Bradstreet's)
Further strength in raw materials, notably cotton, had a pronounced effect upon the textile markets in the United States this week. Prices of print cloths, sheetings and many constructions of gray goods were advanced 1/4 to 1/2 cent a yard, and more in some instances. Mills were reluctant to sell except for spot and nearby delivery, and early in the week several manufacturers of print cloths and sheetings temporarily withdrew offerings pending further developments in raw cotton. Trading was fairly active. More lines of woollens and workstuffs, both suit and overcoating, were advanced by independent producers, owing to the higher cost of wool, and the American Woollen Company revised prices upward on all its worsted lines, the increases ranging from ten to twenty cents a yard on a few lines. Its numbers, while on a few lines the advances ranged from twenty-two to thirty cents a yard. A few weeks ago the company raised woollen goods prices fifteen to forty-five cents a yard. Raw silk has advanced sharply under heavy buying, especially in Yokohama, said to have been largely for the account of American manufacturers of broad silks. Reports indicate some improvement in the volume of forward business reaching broad silk mills. The rise in raw silk has materially stiffened prices for silk goods yet to be made; one prominent silk hosiery manufacturer has advanced prices for his goods a dozen, and other lines of knitted goods generally are expected to reflect the increased cost of cotton and silk if their present levels hold. Burlaps have likewise advanced fully 1/2 cent a yard this week in sympathy with a vigorous rise in Calcutta, which was attributed to the short jute crop. Bag houses bought freely, but a large part of the trading was speculative. With the exception of an active demand for fall lines of men's wear woollens and for worsteds, there has been no large extent of business in finished goods, particularly cottons, which continued rather quiet in primary markets. Purchases in most quarters still being of a hand-to-mouth character.
