CANADIAN NAVY MATTERS IN THE BRITISH HOUSE

London, March 24—(Canadian Associated Press)—In the House of Commons yesterday, replying to a question whether it was true that the Canadian authorities had decided to close the two dockyards at Halifax and Esquimaux, and had declined the offer of two warships from the British Admiralty as the result of the report by Admiral Jellicoe, the First Lord of the Admiralty said he had no information that Canada had declined the offer of the warships. On the contrary, his impression was that Canada had previously accepted the offer. He did not know that the dockyards had been closed, but would make an enquiry.
