DEMONSTRATION, PROVED POPULAR

Not only canning was demonstrated at the Calvin church hall yesterday afternoon, when the Housewives' Leagur held its first demonstration. Nothing was more clearly demonstrated there than that a room equipped for the practical exposition of the aims of the Food Board was needed in the city and when given was greatly appreciated. Almost all the seats were occupied and the Housewives' League had arranged for a canning demonstration by two experts, Miss Gladys Baxter, of St. John, and Miss Sue Prescott, of Albert (N. B.), who in a very business-like manner showed how the directions in the new food board cookery books for canning salmon, greens and plums should be carried out. Mrs. Wilson gave a stirring five minutes' talk on the need of food economy, and Mrs. Richard Hooper made some interesting announcements concerning the use to which the league will put its newly acquired gift of a hall for demonstration purposes.

Mrs. Richard Hooper presided at the meeting and welcomed the large number who were present and she then introduced the two demonstrators. Both Miss Baxter and Miss Prescott are graduates of the Acadia College household science school and Miss Baxter has also taken a post graduate course in dietetica at the Toronto hospital. Miss Prescott canned salmon in two ways, with a brine and with water, and Miss Baxter canned beet greens and plums. Both used the one sterilization or the cold pack method, and their clear explanation of the process helped to make the mysteries of canning thoroughly understood. There are tricks in every trade and the two demonstrators were willing and anxioùs to let their hearers know all which they had learned themselves. As explained by them canning is not a complicated process with a multitude of rules but a simple case of using com-

rules but a simple case of using common sense.

During the demonstration Mrs. Coopet announced that the league had arranged to have twelve ladies give five miniute talks on subjects connected with food conservation at the women's meetings in the city. She also said that the Calvin hall would be opened every afternoon except Saturday and Sunday from 8 to 5.30 p.m. for the three months, that it will be occupied by the league. On every Friday demonstrations to which the public is invited will be held there and on the other days some one will be on hand in the hall to give help and advice to any who may wish to bring their own materials and can them in the hall using the excellent new equipment free, but paying for any lighting or fuel which they may use. A great variety of literature on food economy and conservation will be distributed free also. The announcement was received with many

expressions of pleasure.

Mrs. Wilson spoke on how the woman who stays at home can do her bit helping the Allies, how she can by efficient methods and strict economy be a big factor in winning the war. In concluding her well-worded address she said that now was the time to break old habits and to form new tastes in order that the straitened conditions which would follow the war might be met with pre-

The ninth day of the Allied of-fensive on the Soissons-Rheims Salient saw a lessening in the in-tensity of the battle along the west-ern side of the salient, where only mutual bombardments were in prog-

mutual bombardments were in progress.

Along the Marne, however, and southwest of Rheims, the Franco-Americans, British and Italian troops were still at deadly grips with the enemy on various sectors.

The Germans strove hard in the forest region north of the Marne to hold back the French and American troops, debouching from the woods, in strong counter-attacks. The enemy, however, everywhere was forced slightly further back to the north and the forests now have been almost entirely cleared of Germans.

Southwest of Rheims heavy reinforcements evidently have been thrown along the front, where the British, French and Italians, are fighting. In the immediate region of Reuil, where the battle line turns sharply toward Rheims, the French have captured several important points of vantage, including the village of Reuil and also advanced their line northward, notwithstanding the violence of the German countermove.

To the northeast where the Germans are facing the British the Germans have recaptured Mery and Hill 204, but the British have retained their hold on Vrigny and most of the other territory taken in that

the other territory taken in that region.

Eastward from Rheims in Champagne the French have now regained nearly all their old line positions and daily are harassing the Germans with counter-attacks.

Before the fighting died down along the western side of the Rheims-Soissons salient, the villages of Oulchy-Le-Chateau and Vilemontoire were captured by French and American troops, Thursday, who advanced their lines eastward of Oulchy. The fall of Oulchy gives the Allies forces the key to the heights dominating Fere-En-Tardenois, which lies only a short distance to the east. At Oulchy four guns and hundreds of prisoners were captured by the American and French troops.

Big allied guns have been pulled up in this region and are heavily shelling the sectors before them over which it is purposed to push forward for the capture of Fere-En-Tardenois when the time is ripe. Meantime Allied big guns over the entire salient continue to throw shells from all angles into the German forces inside the big bag.

While there has been no attempt by the Germans at a general retreat

while there has been no attempt by the Germans at a general retreat from the salient, the belief prevails along the battle front that an indication that a retreat is purposed is shown by the fact that the enemy is using comparatively small forces of infantry on various sectors under attack, depending mainly on his ma-


