Boom in Recruiting in the Loyalist City—Seven From Imperial Staff—The Way Some of Them Look at it

The young manhood of the city of St. John is being thoroughly aroused as to the recruiting for overseas service.

Already a generous proportion of fellows with good jobs have joined the colors. Officers have notified regimental officers of their loyal intentions.

In one large wholesale concern on the south side of King street, a group of valued clerks are preparing to follow the lead of one of their young bosses, and their names will soon find place on regimental rosters.

This is the way the recruiting is taking on a genuine boom in loyal old St. John. Business mates and social acquaintances are getting their heads together and deciding to organize a sort of "free corps" as one smiling fellow expressed it to the Times today.

Another said: "Me for that trip! I want to be able to say that I had been in the trenches of Kaiser Bill, especially now that so many of my pals are going."

"The danger of it isn't worrying me," a third volunteer put it. "The proportion of Allies being disabled is very small in figures, but realize the millions that are fighting. Why accidents and sickness at home are almost as great proportionately as the fighting."
