HON. DR. MANION AS SPEAKER AT CAMPBELLTON

Speaks of Conservative Policy in Interests of the Maritimes

CAMPBELLTON, Aug. 15.—In an address of nearly an hour in length, Hon. R. J. Manion, Postmaster-General of Canada, gave a clear exposition of the policies of the Conservative party before a record audience in the Opera House here last night. Mr. Manion dealt at some length with all the outstanding issues of the present election campaign and used caustic words on criticizing the administration of the King government.

"The insane policies of Mr. King," declared the speaker during his discourse, "were shutting down our factories, sapping our country of its youth and driving us into the arms of the United States." Later Mr. Manion declared, "I am not sure that Mr. King was not doing this on purpose. It has been hinted in some parts that Mackenzie King is pro-American and I am not sure that he isn't."

MEIGHEN'S POLICY

In dealing with Premier Meighen's Maritime policy the speaker quoted from Hansard a portion of a resolution brought before the House by Mr. Meighen which contained the Conservative platform as far as the Maritimes are concerned. This provided for a tariff to protect the farmers and manufacturers of the east, called for the use of Maritime ports and provided for an effective and satisfactory revision of freight rates. The adjustment of the freight rates problem, Mr. Manion declared, would be one of the first tasks Mr. Meighen would tackle if placed at the head of Canada's affairs. As a first step toward the achievement of something worth while in this connection the Premier had selected a Maritime man as minister of railways.

During his address, Mr. Manion criticized the Robb budget and computing its benefit, declared that the saving of two or three cents per month by the average person through the belated reduction of postage was about the extent of the benefit to be derived from Mr. Robb's budget.

In closing, Mr. Manion made a plea for support of the Conservative party on a return to stable and honest government. He also spoke highly of Mr. Culligan, the Conservative candidate for Restigouche-Madawaska.

PRESS GATHERING SET FOR GENEVA

Representatives of New Agencies of the World to Meet Shortly


GENEVA, Aug. 16.—Representatives of the great press associations and news agencies of the world are assembling here for the conference called to meet under the auspices of the League of Nations to discuss the improvement of facilities for the international collection and distribution of news. This conference, the most widely representative international press association conference ever held and attended by delegates from the 17 leading press services of 11 different countries, will decide upon the agenda to be considered by a general committee of press experts at a later date. The proposal to call such a committee made originally before the League Assembly by M. Yanes, delegate of Chile, was approved by the Assembly and the Council in the hope that the cause of international good-will could be advanced by greater facility and freedom in the international interchange of news.

The recommendations of the committee of press experts will be merely those of an unofficial body of technicians but it is understood the good offices of the League will be used to secure the adoption of these recommendations by the various nations involved. Among subjects already suggested for the agenda of the committee are: application of a uniform regime for the reduction of charges for telephone conversations and of telegraph rates; uniform urgent rate for telegrams dealing with events for the first importance; copyright for press messages, wireless messages and legislation regarding wireless press messages; liberty of international correspondents and full equality in the distribution of official information; the impartial treatment, dealing with many important issues of the campaign.

The United States will be represented at the preliminary conference by the United Press and the Associated Press. Other press agencies attending are the American Agency of Brazil, the Exchange Telegraph, Central News and Reuters, Ltd., of Great Britain; the Havas Agency and the Radio Agency of France; the Nippon Dempo Tanshinsha and the Nippon Shimbun Renkusha of Japan; the Stefani Agency of Italy; the Suisse Agency of Switzerland; the Tass of Russia; the Telegraphen Union and the Wolff Bureau of Germany; and the Tidningarnas Telegrambyra of Sweden.

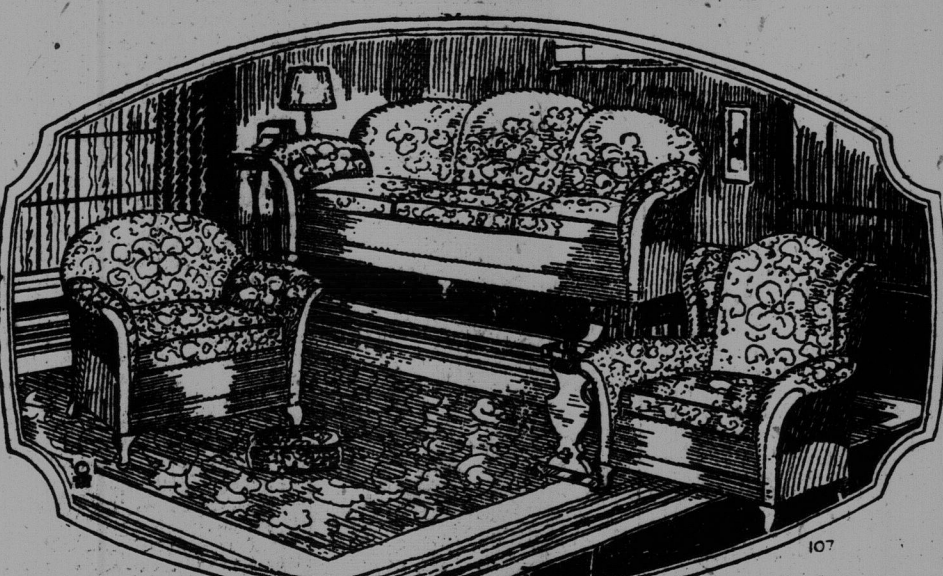

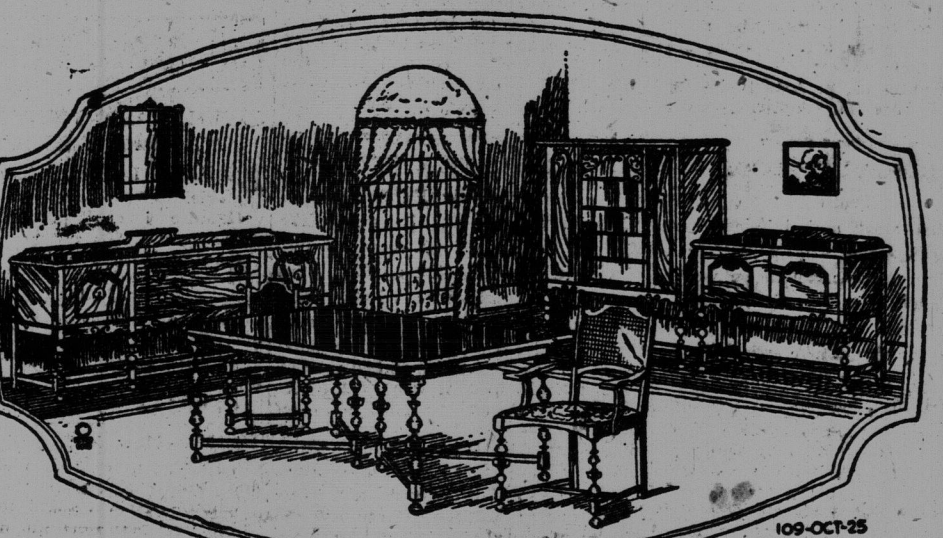

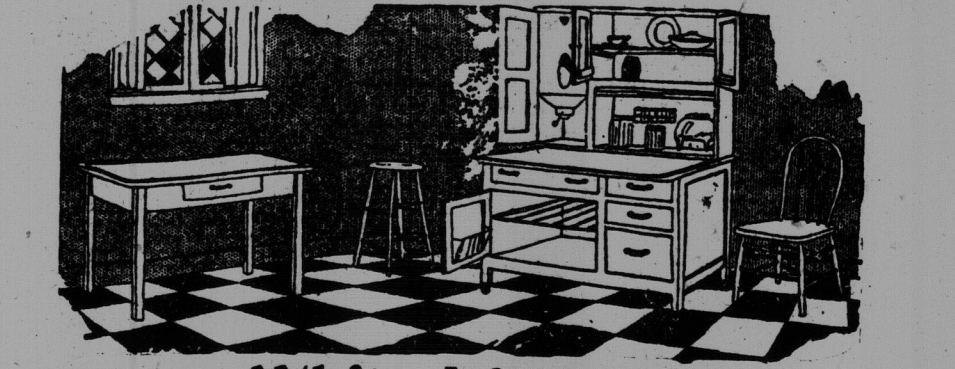
