SEVENTH WITNESS FOR THE PROSECUTION

By their shouts and moves I understood they wanted 1000 francs. It is this soldier (indicated by Vegetin) who made the demand. They had bottles with them. The shortest threw a bottle on the statue and then moved to the counter putting his hand on the boss's head. A few minutes later the proprietress gave a 1000 franc note to the tallest. That is all I know."

EIGHTH WITNESS FOR THE PROSECUTION

Rosella HAVEMERS, waitress, 10 Koolpaal, Antwerp, having been duly sworn, states:

"I am cashier at the Acropole Cafe. One certain night between 9.00 and 10.00 three Canadian soldiers came in the cafe. They asked for three glasses of beer, which they paid with a 1000 franc note. Then they drank some of their own liquor which they had in small bottles. After this they sold a bottle of liquor to some other soldier's. The smallest of the three had a bottle in his hand when he was swaying near the counter. The soldier for 1000 francs came here (pointing to the tallest of the three). I was and I gave it myself to the tallest of the three. I was behind the counter and I could not see who threw the bottle on the statue. I only saw hole in the wall near the statue. That is all I know."
