## Finishes.

AND BEAT OUT HARLEY DAVIDSON -THE ATTENDANCE NEARLY AS LARGE AS ON THE PREVIOUS DAY.

Yesterday's races. Were, if possible, superior to those of the first day of the great C. W. A. Meet. The track was practially perfect and the wind which blew down the stretch on Thursday had

practically perfect and the wind which blew down the stretch on Thursday had materially moderated.

But there was no moderation to the enthusiastic and excited crowd that gathered in the grand stands and on the bleachers. Arrangements were much improved and the management is to be congratulated on the excellent order maintained and the keeping clear of the track throughout the day.

The work of the racers throughout was phenomenal, and the finishes were magnificent. But the triumph of the day rests with Angus McLeod, the sturdy Sazais boy, who smashed the five mile Cananian record by some 34 2-5 seconds in the finest spart of the Meet. The pace set throughout the race was a killing one and but four riders, McCarthy, Davidson, Greatrix and McLeod, in the order named, stayed the clip till the final half, when the pace was still further quickened. Just before the quarter was reached the curly haired Scot, who was then in the rear, commenced a most phenomenal spurt, passing up foot by foot and turning into the stretch at the head of the bunch. A grand sprint followed, but McLeod rather increased his lead, and shot across the tape at a good six feet in lead. The record-breaking time, the magnificent sprint and the popularity of the rider sent the throng wild, and on being recalled McLeod smilingly wanter.
