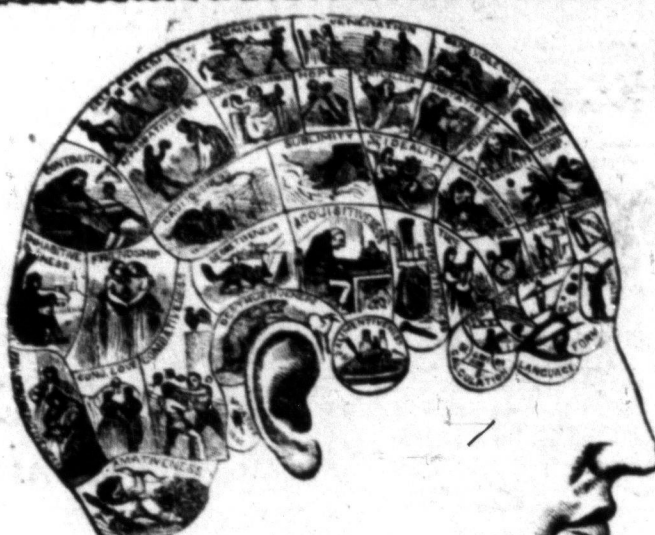

HIS SECOND LESSON!

Mr. Pardo's Record for 1896.

VOTES THAT WERE DIRECTLY AT VARIANCE WITH PATRON PRINCIPLES.

On the eleventh of February, ten days earlier than '96, the second session of the eighth legislature of Ontario was opened with the usual formalities. Momentous rumors of impending changes filled the air. The Globe was parading the motto "Mowat, Laurier, Victory" in every issue. The office of Conservative rule which had buffeted the storms of seventeen years with unbroken continuity, was tottering to its fall under the blows of open enemies from without and the treacherous undermining of false friends from within. Mowat was aching to stab the dying victim. His opportunity soon came to force the knife into a vulnerable spot—the bitterly contested Remedial Bill on which Sir Chas. Tupper staked his political existence.

On the 4th of March, a resolution (see page 54 of the journal of the assembly), which is too long to quote in full was moved by Mr. Crawford, seconded by Mr. Langford, declaring in effect that the Remedial Bill should be abandoned, as the abolition of Separate schools was within the rights of Manitoba. The wording of this did not suit the Attorney General and he moved an amendment, affirming the same thing, almost in the same words, so far as Manitoba's rights were concerned, and as to the validity of the

ABOUT THE Y. M. C. A.

Rev. Mr. Larkin Preached a Very Interesting Sermon.

Last evening at the First Presbyterian church the pastor, Rev. F. H. Larkin, preached an earnest and forceful discourse on the high aims and results of the Young Men's Christian Association. This evening the local branch observed its anniversary, being joined by a union gathering in the same church, and last night the pastor introduced the occasion by a splendid address.

Selecting as his text I Cor. VI, 15: "Know ye not that your bodies are the members of Christ?" Mr. Larkin said he was glad of the opportunity to speak upon the Y. M. C. A. This organization had existed for upwards of half a century, and had proved an ark of safety to thousands of young men and a lifeboat for those stranded on the rocks of sin. Its record was a noble one.

The association developed the young man "all round." It did not not recognize him as all body, all mind or all soul—it aimed at harmonious development. It possessed the gymnasium, the reading room and the quiet moments set apart for spiritual services. The speaker turned his attention to the higher development of the body, noted in the text. The body was honored in the bible. God dwelt in the highest Heaven yet in the human heart. Our bodies were temples of the living God. They should be revered as such. All its members should be consecrated to the Lord and used for His glory. In this connection Mr. Larkin made a strong plea for total abstinence. It was the duty of every one to glorify God with every part of his body.

Manitoba Act. Mr. Whitney then, seconded by Mr. Willoughby, moved an amendment to the amendment, with the rational aim of inducing the assembly to avoid meddling with a matter the settlement of which belonged exclusively to the Dominion parliament. This anti-meddlesome amendment to the amendment was defeated 72 to 16, Mr. Pardo in the majority. The amendment was then carried 51 to 37, Pardo again with the Government, and the original motion as thus amended by the same identical majority—rather close shave, and further turn-over of 8 would have defeated the Government.

March 12th, Mr. Marlet, seconded by Mr. Whitney, moved that the present system of liquor license inspection be abolished, boards of commissioners in future to consist of county judge, warden and one Government appointee, or in cities and towns separated from counties, county judge, mayor and Government appointee. After adjourned debate this was defeated on 13th March, 44 to 26, a narrow majority of 18, Pardo again with the Ministry.

March 18, second reading bill to amend election act, defeated 46 to 33, Pardo with the Government.

March 27, a most useful and far-reaching resolution, moved by Mr. Marlet, seconded by Mr. Willoughby, declared that the accounts of expenditure by Province of Ontario should be published in detail, as in Auditor-General's report of those of the Dominion of Canada, with prices and quantities of all payments over \$5,000, times of payment and amounts paid in colonization road expenditures. This would never do, especially the latter part, what! let the public know what contractors had been given to party stumpers and "handymen," in elections! What! give the names of the contractor and all his sons, sons and nephews who gather to the payroll as eagles to the carcass! The next thing would be to show vouchers. Bookkeepers and evil doers love darkness and muddled book-keeping. The motion was defeated 46 to 26, Pardo as usual with the cabinet ministers, and losing a fine opportunity to uphold his boasted Patron zeal for economy and to protect the ratepayers' pockets from the raids of parasites.

FORGIVE US OUR SINS

As We Forgive Those Who Trespass Against Us—Rev. Mr. Lee's Sermon.

Rev. W. Lee, of Bay City, preached in the William Street Baptist church yesterday. Both sermons were highly interesting and evidenced depth of thought. In the morning his text was drawn from Phil. II, 12, "Work out your own salvation with fear and trembling." The word salvation was used often to mean only eternal life beyond the grave; but it should be remembered that a man who is saved is a sanctified man and that that sanctification should take place here and now. Man should work out his own freedom from the slavery and servitude of sin, and conversion in its true sense means that with God's help man turns from his sin and is saved. God does not command man to fight his own road to heaven but asks him, with His help, to trust in His grace which is sufficient; and to do this is to be a brave and fearless Christian.

Take faith. Most Christians when they pray do so as though God had a stock of faith in heaven and would hand out a slice to them when they ask it; but this is a mistake. He expects us so to act that our faith may grow and thus do wonderful things to the upholding of His cause and His kingdom. The most unforgiving people, said the speaker, are to be found in the Christian church and yet they will pray Him to forgive their sins; to grant them that forgiveness they deny to those about them. This was one of the things which must be overcome if we would obey the words of the text and work out our salvation.
