Washington, D. C., July 30.—The bureau of statistics yesterday reported that during the fiscal year ending June 30th, 1910, the United States exported manufactured goods to the value of \$758,000,000, by far the greatest amount on record.

Figures for each ten years beginning with 1880 show the increase of exported goods to be enormous. In 1889, according to the bureau, the value of the exported manufactured was \$122,000,000.
