STREET IMPROVING.—A number of Salvationists, sentenced to twenty-one days' imprisonment for street preaching at Stamford, England, have been conveyed to Leicester Prison. The army assembled and knelt at the prison gates every morning.

THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL AND THE PRINCE OF THE CHURCH.—QUEBEC, Oct. 4.—On hearing of the fire at the Cardinal's palace here, Lord Lansdowne telegraphed Sir Hector Langevin asking him to tender his Eminence in the name of the Government the hospitality of the Vice-regal quarters on the citadel pending the repairs to the palace.

TEMPERANCE MEETING.—An interesting temperance meeting—the second of the series—was held in Temperance Hall last Sunday evening. The chair was occupied by Mr. Wm. Johnston, prayer was offered by Mr. Joseph Tweedie and addresses were delivered by Revs. Messrs. McKay and Waite. An efficient choir carried out the musical part of the programme.

SHOCKING DEATH.—An instantaneous death of 27th ult. to the Glasgow says a horrible accident occurred at Baker's Lake last week. A son of Joseph Michaud, (who owns a small mill there) was running a shingle machine, when he became unconscious, and falling against the saw, was almost cut in two. He only lived an hour.

FOUNDED.—The Glasgow's Blackville correspondent says:—"Salmon are very plentiful in the main river, and as the fisheries officers are making an effort to stop the slaughter, there are lively fights on the river. The result so far has been that while the officers are getting some nets, &c., fishermen are having fair luck in getting salmon."

THE SLAUGHTERED CHILDREN.—QUEBEC, Oct. 4.—The incident on the bodies of the children killed by the explosion of a shell on the Island of Orleans caused much feeling of culpable negligence against the employees of Quebec Cartridge Works, which were under the control of the military department. The father of the deceased will sue the corporation for damages against the military department.

SOLDIER DEAD.—A St. John dispatch of Monday last states that Alex. Van den, 33 years of age, who leaves a wife and six children went partying shooting at Barneville, Kings county, on Saturday. The cartridge failed to explode, and the man was instantly killed by the explosion of his own shot.

THE SLAUGHTER.—A gentleman resident on the Bay du Vin river informs us that the people on that river have, this year, been dragged with snags by nets with impunity, and that for years almost nothing has been regularly carried on. He has no doubt that the same destructive work will be engaged in this fall, unless proper protection is afforded, than the department has heretofore given the river. Nets are also set in the river and head of tide for salmon. Cannot anything be done to prevent this illegal work?

REPORTED.—Capt. Messano, of the Italian bark Etna, which arrived at Bathurst on Saturday last, reports that in the middle of the gulf stream, about 100 miles from that port, on Sept. 20, he passed the American bark Oasis abandoned. She was not deep in the water. The fore and main masts had been cut off. The vessel was in a state of complete dereliction. The forward deck house was gone, but the after cabin was intact. They did not board her.

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CATTLE SLAUGHTER.—The train bound on the Grand Falls branch, N. B., seems to have taken the contract to kill all the live stock along the road. There are reports they killed three cattle at the Rockway, Friday three horses at Greenriver, and the train was derailed and detained several hours. Saturday night a wrecking train was over a cow and ran over the same cow and the engine was derailed and almost totally destroyed and the fire hooked out yesterday afternoon.
