Extracts from Act of Assembly 60, Vict. A. D. 1897.

The property to the amount of Five Hundred dollars of a wife described by her husband and compelled to support herself; and where the whole opporety owned by a widow, as well the place where she resides as elsewhere, is under the value of Fifteen Hundred dollars, and such wit-bw supports uninor children of her own or of her deceased husband, her property in the parish where she resides shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of Two Hundred dollars; and also to the extent of One Hundred dollars for each minor child wholly supported by her, if she has no property in the parish where she resides, then such exemption shall be allowed in the place where sadil property is situated; but such exemption shall not apply or extend to school taxes.


