Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the District Land Office or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six month's residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

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CONDEMN TRADE POLICY OF GREAT BRITAIN

LONDON, Sept. 22.—Henry Chaplin, a former president of the board of agriculture and member of the tariff commission of 1904, speaking yesterday at Stourbridge, said that present Canadian duties required annually to purchase sterling to the amount of \$20,000,000, and that if England had conceded her slight preference she asked, the whole of the market would have been placed at the disposal of workers in England, because duties would have been imposed upon other countries which would have prevented their interfering. That was an offer made by Canada some years ago, of which, with the greatest folly and unwisdom, we failed to avail ourselves at the time. Other nations, he feared, were now in competition with this country for similar favors from Canada.

At last night's meeting it was also decided that a call for \$1,500 be made for the purpose of finishing the upper part of the institute building so as to have it ready for occupation in time for the opening of the winter port season.

The report of Manager S. L. Gorbett, of the chairmen of the building committee and of the treasurer, were read. All reports stated that the society was in a satisfactory position. It was recommended, however, that efforts be made to raise \$1,500 as soon as possible in order to finish the building. A special meeting with regard to this matter will be held shortly.

The Institute is in receipt of two photographs of the dedication of the Canadian annex to the building of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society in London. The local Seaman's Institute Society is affiliated with the London body. The photographs were sent to St. John by Rev. Mr. Matthews, secretary of the London society. The latter body has appointed Alfred Hart of South Africa, its Canadian secretary.
