RESEARCH CAMPAIGN IS LAUNCHED IN LONDON.

Army of Investigators Will be Employed in Many Lines to Discover Origin of Disease.

A most ambitious campaign to raise ads to fight cancer has been launched by influential organizations sup-ported by Britain's famous physicians and surgeons, says a London despatch. During 1921 one out of every seven deaths in Britain from the age of thirty and upwards was caused by can-cer and still the profession remains ignorant as to the cause or cure of the disease. No sum has been set by the managers of the campaign as a definite goal, but they hope to raise more than \$5,000,000 to be used in research work

Spider Silk Stockings.

Although the manufacture of stock ings from spider silk has been sus-pended, there is talk in France of re-viving the industry. Apart from stockings, the silk is a necessity to the makers of theodolites and other sur veying instruments. In these instru ments, two lines of spider silk cross the centre of the glass at right angles.

Formerly there was a factory in the South of France where delicately weven spider silk stockings and other trifles were made, but it failed on account of the difficulties which attend spider farming on a large scale.

Spiders cannot be penned up like chickens, but require plenty of room, otherwise they fight and devour each other. Also many attendants are re-quired to feed and tend them. The method employed for getting

the silk from the spider requires much time and care. First, the astonished spider is tossed from hand to hand. In its anxiety it emits a thread of silk in order to escape by dropping. A kind of wide-pronged hairpin is used by a winder to gather up the silk. By the time the spider has lowered

itself by several hundred feet of silk it is allowed to reach the ground and walk off.

Seeing Through the Skin.

A French scientist, M. Farigoule, claims that sight is possible by means of certain elementary organs which exist in the human skin. He recently published the results of his experi-One of the cases described relate

to a subject who at a second trial, with eyelids tightly fastened down and eyes covered with a thick bandage se-curely fixed, was able to distinguish such colors as white from pale grey orange from ochre, and at the end of a further sitting to read two couplets. As the characters to be deciphered were placed in a photographic frame under glass, it was impossible for them to be identified by touch, and moreover the glass frame itself was handed to the subject in such a way that no-body present could see through it. In this particular case, the success

was obtained with the forehead, right cheek bone, and fingers. Certain areas of the skin are more receptive to this "second sight" than others.
