No. 2 S.F.T.S., Uplands, Ontario.	1st August 1945		Regular Sunday Church services held in the Recreation Hall, well attended. Partly cloudy. R185345 LAC Holt, J.A. landed Harvard AH189 at R.2 Edwards Field with undercarriage retracted. "B" category. No injury.	
	2nd August		Cloudy to overcast - hazy. New Squadron of Air Cadets arrived - No. 241 Baron Byng Squadron, consisting of 3 Officers and 65 cadets. They were addressed by the Commanding Officer on arrival at Uplands. The Women's Division had a Housewarming Supper and Dance in their newly-decorated Recreational Centre. It was attended by the Commanding Officer, and Officers Commanding the various Sections on the Station. W.D. Officers from A.F.H.Q. and No. 7 "M" Depot were also present. A very enjoyable time was had by all; the evening terminated with the presentation of prizes by the Commanding Officer to the winners of the special dances.	
	3rd August		Partly Cloudy. GB1567351 LAC Maughan, C. ground looped Harvard #2889 on landing during night flying. C-2 category accident - no injury. At R.1 Field, Carp. Uplands flies the 2 "Efficiency Pennant" once again (see attached clipping).	
	4th August		Overcast - rain in late afternoon. Wings Dinner and Dance, Course #79. Commanding Officer and other Senior Officers attended. A very successful affair, and a good time was had by all. A team, composing 2 airman and 2 airwomen from Uplands competed in a Quiz Contest over radio station CKCL in Toronto against #16 S.F.T.S., Hagersville. Uplands were the victors. The silver "Cup of Knowledge" was brought back to this Station.	
	5th August		Partly cloudy. A Station Swimming Meet was held in the local pool, although, owing to the unfavourable weather, the competitors were few, the spectators many, and all personnel heartily enjoyed themselves (see attached excerpt from Station newspaper, "The Airman").
