FIRST WITNESS
FOR THE
PROSECUTION

Captain W. H. Rose, RCAMC, No. 1 Canadian
General Reinforcement Unit, having been duly
sworn states:-

I am Captain W. H. Rose, RCAMC, Medical Officer
No. 1 Canadian General Reinforcement Unit. On the
5th October 1944 the accused, whom I recognize,
appeared before me during medical inspection of an
incoming draft. According to his immunization
record contained in his MBM 1, Part 1, he required
further inoculations. These he refused to accept
having no reason except that he did not wish to take
them and that he did not think he needed them. I
explained to him that there was a Routine Order No.
1809 which ordered that all personnel receive these
inoculations. I further explained that he could be
charged for refusing these inoculations and gave him
further opportunity to comply with these orders. He
still refused and I informed him that he was under
open arrest and that he will be charged accordingly.

The accused declined to cross examine the witness.
