

He had another in the Wehrmacht building and he lived near the sports ground. I was with Schappe in the Wehrmacht building on two occasions to see Hoffmann.

96. On the last occasion I was in Berlin, that is when I was leaving for Boisson, Blackman and Leigh told me that Flt Sergt Hughes D Baker was supposed to come and see them that day and pay them for broadcasting on the German radio. I asked them why they had done it after I had warned them to get back to Stalag. They said that Bowlby had got them on to the radio and they didn't think it would make much difference as they had only broadcast one or two lines in a play.

97. "Fred" Sturmer a German was a Lance Corporal in the SS and had been a friend of Cooper's in the regular SS. I have never seen him, but heard he had spent a bit of time in the U.S.A. I don't know what his connection was with the BFC but I think Perkins told me he was at Hildersheim or Dresden.

98. Holland, who said he was a German was interpreter at Stalag 3 D. He said he had been a salesman in England for 8 or 9 years. He was aged 34 or 35. Wolfe was Heimpel's secretary and was supposedly a lance/corporal.

99. My own alias in the BFC was Edwin Bartlett. Prior to that when I was working with Schappe my alias was Martin SCHRODER.

100. Gallagher's alias at Lamsdorf was Gabriel.

101. I realise that the position in which I now stand may result in my being put on a charge of treason. The reason I did what I have done was to gain the confidence of the Germans so that I could obtain information which might later on be of use to the British authorities. If the Germans hadn't got so suspicious of me I would have tried to get one or two fellows into the Free Corps or anything to commit sabotage. In fact I had tried to get to the Canadian Offlag to see about this but was refused permission to travel.

This second statement has been read over by me and is true.
