Statement of a Tobacco Buyer.

In a statement by Mr. F. R. Gregory, representative of the Imperial Tobacco Company, of Montreal, published in the *Chatlam Planet*, in the autumn of 1910, that gentleman said his Company had purchased \$1,000,000 (£200,000) worth of tobacco in the counties of Essex and Kent, and were still looking for more.

"The following list of prices paid to various well-known Kent farmers," said Mr. Gregory in his published statement, "will give some indication of the profits of tobacco growing this year:

"H. W. Arnold, Louisville, nine acres, received \$2,400 (£480) for his crop.

"George Blackburn, Louisville, nine acres, received \$2,300 (£460) for his crop.

"W. Pickering, Clatham Township, seven acres, received \$4,680 (£936) for his crop.

"George Stephens, Harwich, ten acres, received from \$1,800 to \$2,000 (£360 to £400) for his crop.

"A. Ham Snow, Blenheim district, 28 acres, received \$6,500 (£1,300) for his crop.

"W. R. McGregor, 22 acres, received \$5,500 (£1,100) for his crop.

"Neil Campbell, 42 acres, received \$3,200 (£640) for his crop."

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
